A Good Year to Do Great Things

The beginning of a new year is laden with all kinds of hopes and expectations. We see January 1st as a new beginning and a clean slate. To use a term from the Old Testament, the new year is a time for teshuvah. While we often translate this word as "repentance," a more literal rendering from the Hebrew is "turning." As people of God, this can be a very hopeful resolution – that in the new year we will turn ourselves more squarely to God, turn to face one another with greater love and compassion, and turn to face our true selves with greater honesty and forgiveness.

The Franciscan friar Richard Rohr, in his mystical devotional book On the Threshold of Transformation, shares a legend born out of the indigenous culture of the Great Plains. According to folklore, men from those tribes, as they roused their sons each morning, would say to them, "It is a good day to do great things." This simple greeting transformed what could have been an ordinary day into one fraught with expectation, hope, and possibility. "We need to allow our souls to be stirred," Rohr writes, "by a magnificent ambition – something that makes us jump out of bed in the morning, that calls us to be some kind of hero in our own kind of story."

As the sun begins to rise on a new year here at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, it is my sense that God our Father is rousing us to a more urgent sense of expectation, hope, and possibility. You are blessed with strong hearts, strong faith, and a strong commitment to mission and ministry. We all have our flaws, but every great legend, and every great success story, begins with flawed individuals who end up doing more than they ever dreamed that they could. We are poised to write a new story, and it could even be heroic.

So, let's turn to God, turn to each other, and turn to face the best version of ourselves. In short, let's wake up! It is a good year to do great things!

One80 Place's mission is to end and prevent homelessness one person, one family at a time. We believe that the only solution

to homelessness is housing and that everyone deserves a home. We are the largest homeless service provider in the Lowcountry, and we shelter about one-third of the homeless population every night. Our 160-bed shelter in downtown Charleston serves men, women, children, and Veterans. Once safely in our facility, our clients have access to an onsite health clinic, attornevs. case managers, and three meals a day. We have an onsite clinic to help diagnose issues that can threaten your long-term housing. We have a partnership with the VA to end Veteran homelessness. We have legal services that help people navigate through mountains of paperwork. Ultimately, however, all of these programs are in line with our housing efforts.

One80 Place follows the "Housing First" approach to serve our clients. This means that from the moment families and individuals walk through our doors, housing is at the forefront of everything we do and say. This allows us to move clients into their new homes as soon as possible and allows us to serve more clients over the course of a year. We have operated a shelter and community kitchen since 1984 and have expanded our services to more effectively end and prevent homelessness. In 2018, we successfully ended or prevented homelessness for 980 individuals.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Two months before her 15th birthday she was in the foster care system. Her mother deserted her; her father was on the run accused of abuse. To look at her, you would not think she was any different than the child next door. She was beautiful and smart. Yet within herself she kept secrets, stories about a divided family that had a long history of dysfunction and betrayal. The community she came from was notorious for drugs and shootings, and that's where she found her network of help. To end those friendships was to abandon her support; to keep contact with her friends was to allow her to remain in a sea of trouble that was sure to swallow her.

We were Annie's first foster family; she was our first foster teenager. And while our backgrounds and stories were very different, we clicked. We mostly just "fit." Technology was her greatest resource to connect with friends and she was often in love with the boys she knew from her past. Her friends, especially the boys, would listen to her stories and would empathize as best they could. Her past was her present; it was hard to let go. And for every person we – or the system – took away from her, the more deeply entrenched she became to the few that remained.

Annie looked for love. From the boys she met to the broken familial relationships that once existed, love was flighty and often conditional. It had to hurt Annie; often she would cry from loneliness. Because Sunday worship was an important part of our life, we took Annie with us each week. We know it made a difference to her because one Sunday, during the sermon, she began to cry. The Reverend Elizabeth McGuire, using John 17 when Jesus prays for us as her text, weaved her faith journey into her message.

"You may have doubts, you may have fears, you may not feel much at all when it comes to talking about Jesus. You may not know God in deep and intimate and powerful ways, but... God knows you. Jesus has prayed for you and... Jesus still does. In each and every moment, the moments of anger, the moments of calm, the moments of laughter, the moments of tears, Jesus is praying for you...If [we] can remember these words of Christ, then that journey towards faith and love and hope can go that much closer to knowing and living in confidence that God certainly knows you and loves you."

Annie's tears were tears of redemption, acceptance, thankfulness, and love. Annie had found a new beginning!

We often make New Year's resolutions and promises we try to keep at the beginning of each year. "I'm going to exercise every day," we resolve. "I will be nicer to people around me," we promise. The Good News for us is that each day can be a new beginning in Christ! Whether it's January 1, February 12 or July 25, each day we have the opportunity for a new relationship with Christ. The Christian Education ministry at Mount Pleasant offers many opportunities to for us to walk in our faith. From Sunday School on Sundays to Get Fed on Wednesdays, youth prayer breakfasts to summer retreats, weekday studies to small groups during Lent, we are invited and welcomed to explore our faith through study and grow as a congregation, a community of disciples responding to Christ's call to share the Good News of the Gospel in all we do.

Get Fed

January 15 - April 29, 2020

Get Fed is back on January 15, 2020, with classes and opportunities for children, youth, and adults. Registration for elementary children's LOGOS is a TWO step process and is now open. New to this winter's registration is a Parent Covenant parents must sign before a child can register. This covenant allows opportunities for adults to participate in all aspects of LOGOS. Children will see the fruits of parent involvement in smaller Bible Time groups, structured recreation, more hands-on-deck in music, and more opportunities to build relationships with adults during dinner. The adult classes offered this spring are **UNAFRAID** and **The Gospel of John, The Film**.

UNAFRAID: Living with Courage and Hope in Uncertain Times by the Rev. Adam Hamilton

In this 5 week series, we explore the most common worries and fears experienced by Americans today, consider practical steps for overcoming these fears, and reflect upon fear in the light of scripture and a faith that promises again and again that we don't need to live in fear. Let's live with courage and hope. For anyone struggling with fear, worry or anxiety, or wonders how families and communities can live as peacemakers in troubled times, *Unafraid* offers an informed and inspiring message full of practical solutions. Each lesson will involve 15-20 min video, group discussion and table discussion. This study will meet in the Parlor and will be led by Rev. Bart Edwards.

The Gospel of John, The Film

Many of us have read or are familiar with the Gospel of John. We know it is the fourth Gospel in the New Testament. The Leadership Bible says, "John provides a treasure trove of Jesus' stories and teachings not found in the other Gospels. John is also the simplest and most profound of the Gospels. Rich in insights and application, this book is the greatest evangelistic tool ever written."

While this may all be true, when we see the Gospel of John come to life in film, our understanding of who and what Jesus was like might change. "Is this the Jesus we read about in scripture?" We wonder. "Is this the Jesus I know? My Jesus does not (or maybe does) look like the Jesus depicted in the film." Over five weeks leading up to Lent, we will watch the film The Gospel of John, a word for word adaptation of the Good News Bible translation and explore questions that arise as we interpret what we see. The only text you will need is your Bible. This study will meet in the Fellowship Hall and will be led by Dan Wiard.

This year our Lenten focus will use the book Neighborhood Church: Transforming Your Congregation into a Powerhouse for Mission.
