Reformed and Reframing

"... like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:5)

One of our foundational beliefs as Presbyterians is that the body of Christ is a "church reformed, always to be reformed according to the Word of God." In other words, we are convinced that the Holy Spirit is not done with us yet. God, as the master Creator, is still very much at work building us into a "spiritual house" and "holy priesthood." For this reason, we as Christians must always remain open to the possibility that the way we "do church" may need to be reformed and reframed as the world around us changes.

On Wednesday, September 4, 2019, we will gather in the Fellowship Hall for a roundtable discussion of some of the ways that we, as Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, are working to reform and reframe some of our congregational structures to be more supportive of our current missions and ministries. The conversation will focus on three primary areas:

- the reorganization of the session as the governing council of the church;
- (2) the reorganization of the staff to support our mission and ministry; and
- (3) the reorganization of diaconate responsibilities and priorities.



Reformed and Reframing, cont.

1)With regard to the session, our goal is to strike a healthy balance between (a)freedom and flexibility in our various ministries and (b) sessional engagement with those ministries. Our sense is that some ministry teams feel disconnected from the larger church and that our communication about the good work we are doing as a church could be more effective. Changes in the sessional committee structure are designed to address these issues.

(2) The staff is also being reorganized to address gaps left by recent transitions and restore a more traditional Presbyterian structure. In particular, care is being taken to align our team members and their job descriptions more closely with the alignment of the lay leadership of the elders and deacons. We will also be working to be more intentional about telling the story of Mount

Pleasant Presbyterian Church. Amazing things are happening here, and we need to be telling that good news to the world!

(3) Last but certainly not least, a task force has been hard at work with our deacons to assess their ministries and re-energize this vital part of our church leadership. We think you will be excited to hear about the changes that are coming for these individuals who have been called to extend the care and compassion of Christ throughout our congregation.

Please make every effort to join the "Reforming and Reframing" conversation at **7 p.m. on September 4**th. I look forward to seeing you there.

In 2015, Westminster John Knox Press published the book, *100 Things Every Child Should Know before Confirmation: A Guide for Parents and Youth Leaders*, by Rebecca Kirkpatrick. One hundred is not significantly large and often it is not overwhelming. Whether we have 100 pennies or 100 peanuts, 100 items of clothing or there are 100 people at a River Dogs' baseball game, 100 is manageable. But when we put 100 in the context of biblical knowledge and our faith, the number can suddenly become daunting.

Confirmation class at Mount Pleasant happens in eighth grade. So by the time a young person is roughly thirteen, Kirkpatrick believes "the list of 100 Bible stories, characters, verses, church traditions, habits and conversations represents the foundational knowledge...children and younger teenagers should have in order to make the transition to the next level of faith expression as older teenagers and young adults." Consider some of the following questions based on Kirkpatrick's list of 100. While some of these questions are easily answered, others may be quite challenging.

"From the youngest children to the wisest disciples, from Sunday School to weekday gatherings, there are opportunities to help encourage us as disciples and apostles of Jesus Christ."

- How many books are in the Bible?
- Old Testament stories are about what people?
- What are the first stories told in the book of Genesis 1-11?
- Jacob had many sons. Can you name all of his sons? Who was Jacob's favored son?
- Name two of the Ten Commandments. What do those commandments mean?
- Who was David? What did David first do when we read about him in the Bible?
- How does the story of Jonah end?
- Where was Jesus baptized? What happened after Jesus was baptized?
- When did the disciples think Jesus was a ghost?
- What does Jesus say about loving our enemies?
- Who was Paul?

- What type of literature is the book of Revelation?
- What is Advent?
- What are the elements of Communion?
- What happens in worship when someone is baptized?

A great place to get a solid foundation on which to build our faith is in the Christian Education ministry of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church. From the youngest children to the wisest disciples, from Sunday School to weekday gatherings, there are opportunities to help encourage us as disciples (and apostles) of Jesus Christ. Whether you are a leader or participant, we invite you to engage in the Christian Education ministry of MPPC and see where God might take you.

Adult Faith Formation

Adult Sunday School (9:45-10:45 a.m.)

The Academy of St. John (SB 206)

The Academy class works to equip God's people through expanding our understanding of Biblical revelation and how we live it out in the world.

The Middle (SB 209)

We are all in the middle of something. Some of us are in the middle of raising kids, our lives, taking care of parents, etc. All of us are exploring the middle of our faith journey.

The Harbor (SB 210)

This class will delve deeply into the book of Exodus and look at how God chooses Moses to lead the Hebrew people to the Promised Land.

Seekers and Sowers (SB 207)

Read and study the Bible verse by verse with this wonderful group of men and women who aim to read and reflect deeply together.

What Do We Believe? An Adult "Confirmation" Class (Parlor)

Sometimes we aren't sure what we believe as individuals and as a PCUSA congregation. This basic class is a place to discover and explore our faith and the denomination.

New Class (Name TBA) (GH 122)

This class is designed specifically for young adults. Using contemporary studies, the class explores and discusses Scripture and its application to life.

Adult Sunday School (11:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m.)

Connect 3 (GH 123, 125)

This Sunday School class meets during the last Service of Worship and offers conversation and discussion geared around scripture and contemporary studies. From books of the Bible to topical studies, this class offers life application insight into each lesson.

Christopher was especially excited to show everyone "his" room, which is now the Green Room.

Chelsea's mother Mary wrote of being overcome "once again walking into that comforting,

peaceful and loving" home. Since their stay, this hospital hospitality house has welcomed more than 1,650 families.. offering each a safe, secure, temporary home-away-from-home.

For Chelsea, who said she "loved getting together with everyone" again, it will always be the place God gave her and her family "a new beginning."

JOIN OUR ESOL OUTREACH PROGRAM

We are blessed at MPPC to be a part of a missional church that focuses on our neighbors here and far away. We have offered ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes since 2015 with a goal of helping adult students learn or improve their English so that they may participate more fully in the life of our community. We are always looking for volunteers who can help in the classroom or with administrative tasks. No prior experience is required.



When asked how our classes have impacted their lives some of our students have told us about how they found a better job, such as at McDonalds, because they are able to communicate more effectively. Others have told us about how our classes have helped them make friends and end their sense of isolation as they learn English. Volunteers have told us about learning of different cultures and countries while coming to understand that no matter where we come from we all share similar hopes and dreams. And all of us have seen God at work in these little communities of neighbors as we meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings throughout the school year. At the end of each semester students receive certificates on the number of hours they have attended and students and volunteers enjoy an "end-of-semester" party in the fellowship hall. Students often share traditional food from their own countries.

Since we began we have served more than 250 students. They have come from more than 26 different countries and spoken 18 different languages. Educational backgrounds have ranged from elementary level to PhDs. We have been very fortunate to have more than 50 volunteers.

Our Fall semester will begin August 29th with registration. Classes are held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings (6:30-8:00) upstairs in Seabrook and Grace Hall. We are planning to have 7 classes - 2 beginner, 2 intermediate, 2 advanced and one advanced conversation. For each class there is a lead teacher, who is experienced, as well as one or more assistants.
