

Lenten Self-Reflection

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.

He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished.

(Matthew 4:1-2)

Forty days plus Sundays. That's the duration of the season we call Lent. Following the Council of Nicaea in the year 325, the bishops called for a church-wide period of preparation that would precede the celebration of the Easter Vigil. The length of this period would mirror the forty days that Jesus spent being tempted in the wilderness. Sundays would be excluded from the count, presumably because each Sunday can be considered a "little Easter" of its own.

Regardless of how you choose to mark this season – by giving something up, giving something away, giving something back, or giving some other part of you to God – this is a time for you to ponder *what it really means to be you*. God created you to fill a place in this world that no one else can fill. There has never been anyone quite like you, and there never will be again. As pastor and author Frederick Buechner has written, "During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves."

As you engage in this holy discipline, perhaps some of Frederick Buechner's questions will serve as a helpful guide:

"If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in twenty-five words or less?

Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember?

Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?

If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?"

"To hear yourself try to answer questions like these," Buechner says, "is to begin to hear something not only of who you are but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business all in all, but if sack-cloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end." ¹

P&G Update

The Property & Ground's Ministry (P&G) has been hard at work. In 2018, we repaired the rot on the Administration building and the Sanctuary and repainted the areas. We have replaced all 14 windows in the Fellowship Hall due to rot damage. We also plan to replace the windows in the Choir Room in February 2019.

We pressure washed several of our buildings in February with a hope to have money in the budget to paint some of the buildings in 2019. We had to replace two of the four Fellowship Hall HVAC units this last Fall/Winter and rework a closet that held one of the HVAC units. All four HVAC units were initially installed at the same time, so we may be replacing two more units sooner rather than later. We had a successful Work Day with the Confirmands and church members on January 27. We painted, cleaned out the church bus, removed and moved a lot of tree limbs, and light yard work. We are blessed to have such dedicated members who are willing to give of their time to our campus.

Education

Education goes beyond influencing the lives of students, it has the power to impact families, communities and the nation. Many parents come to know Christ by seeing the love and knowledge their children are receiving through a Christian education. An education provides the skills needed for employment and a successful future. At each campus there is a school for pre-K through grade 6.

At another site, Barye Fe, there is a secondary school with grades 7 through 11; grades 12 and 13 are to be built soon. Pastor Leon's wife is the principal of the secondary school. Plans are being made also to build a vocational school and a Bible college.

Health Care

Another goal of HOM is to share the love of Jesus by promoting wellness by providing quality health and dental care to the communities surrounding the campuses. There is a clinic in Cite Soleil; health care is also provided at the other campuses. Last year, 30,000 patients were treated with the help of 26 medical teams, 6 dental teams and 3 surgeons and the few local health care providers.

During the first week of December, Rev. Bart Edwards, Suzy Edwards and members of the International Mission Team (IMT) visited Haiti Outreach Ministries. In January, they sent \$4,000 to HOM for replacement of a sewer line at the House of Hope. IMT has decided to partner with and support HOM. IMT will begin making plans soon to send a mission team this fall to provide health care. There is also the opportunity to support individual students with small monthly contributions.

those in need.

At each of three mission sites, Terre Noire, Cite Soleil and Repatriote there is a preK-6 school, health clinic, clean water access and a church. They provide opportunity for safe learning, worship and fellowship. Pastor Leon and Jackie's daughter, Nadege Gay, is the assistant superintendent of the schools and head of the House of Hope where she oversees operations. Nadege has long had a passion for assisting orphan children in Haiti. She, along with other partners, started the House of Hope, which now has 15 girls in residence. They call her "mom" and attend school in Terre Noire.

Worship

The church is the foundation of HOM'S ministry. There is no doubt that God has touched the hearts of many and His work is visible. Each Sunday, over 3,000 people gather
