There's hardly a child who didn't love to color when he or she was young. If you are reading this you are probably among them. I loved to color as well and one of the exciting things about the beginning of a school year is that you got a brand new carton of Crayola crayons. None had been used and none was broken. Do you remember when the 64 count carton came out? How exciting! Now they have colors numbering well over a hundred in just about any hue or shade you can imagine.

There are many shades and hues at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church as well. I am not referring to skin color, though that would be delightful if we had more racial diversity among us, but we certainly have a church with a diversity of ages, passions, commitments, skills and interests. That makes for a healthy church in my opinion but it also requires mutual forbearance and respect for one another. Do you realize how much our church needs each of us and all of us in spite of our individual and personal preferences and interests? Everyone may not be interested in mission trips abroad, Sunday School classes, Habitat for Humanity, Charleston Area Justice Ministry, Meals on Wheels, singing in the choir or teaching children or adults, etc. But praise the Lord that many are passionate about these diverse ministries and our church is the richer for it.

Another thing about Crayola colors: I receive a daily devotion from the American Bible Society and one devotion this week told of how as a child the writer would get upset if he broke a color in his coloring box. He would discard it and want a new box. Wisely his mother told him one day that broken crayons could still color and did not need to be discarded. Sometimes in life we get broken too and may assume wrongly that our productive years are behind us and our efforts in the church or community don't really matter. But broken colors and broken lives create incredible canvases and communities of faith.

So find your niche in this church's numerous diverse ministries, and let us celebrate how we can color the Old Village and the global village with lively and beautiful hues of Jesus Christ and his love.

Missions: Sonrisa Bonita

The human body has many parts, but the many parts make up one whole body. So it is with the body of Christ. — 1 Corinthians 12:12

My mother doesn't speak any Spanish, nor does she have any medical training. But two years ago, she travelled with our church to Honduras on a medical mission trip and applied fluoride on the teeth of young children. The trip had such a significant impact on her that she felt a calling from God to take me along the next year.

While counseling at Camp St. Christopher that summer, the lessons we taught about the Body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:12) reinforced what I had heard constantly in Sunday School. I had learned how to be a member of the Body of Christ from a mission trip abroad to LAMB, the children's home MPPC sponsors, and even through doing local mission work with the high school ministry.

In high school, I had taken a few Spanish classes, so on our MPPC medical mission trip to Honduras, I helped translate for Dr. Neill Herring, my own pediatrician and a member of our church. One day, while the dental clinic was crowded with children, I walked over to help. A young girl was in hysterics about having a tooth pulled. I drew upon memories of books that I had read when I was young and told her stories of lions and princesses. I reminded her to be brave like the heroes from the stories.

Inspired by these experiences, for my senior thesis, I decided to study the health inequalities in Honduras. I felt called to create change so that young people would not keep losing their teeth to decay — so every child could be proud of their smile.

From that, I had an idea for how our church could further its impact. I wrote and designed a children's coloring book called *Sonrisa Bonita*—Beautiful Smile—to teach oral care. The once rather boring topic suddenly came to life through the unique, native phrases and

illustrations of these niños hondureños. Still needing funds to print my coloring book and travel to these Honduran schools, I met with our church's International Missions Team and received a grant to fund 500 coloring books, toothbrushes, and crayons for elementary school students.

In the book, a girl, María, tackles her fear and learns how to take care of her teeth. Then she teaches her friends the same. The children I met were so excited to have a book that was their own! While teaching kids how to brush their teeth seems like such an arbitrary call from God, I ended up appreciating spending my senior year as a member of the Body of Christ.

Going on mission trips is a perfect way for you to be actively serve as a member of the Body of Christ! It is rewarding to see the joy in young children. Mission work quickly rekindles faith in the power God has with His people.

The week I spent in Honduras for my thesis project only allowed me to bring this information to a few small villages. Currently, I am expanding the content and book distribution so that more children can understand the importance of dental care and raise their own standards of living.

As global citizens and as members of the Body of Christ, we all have a duty to help others who may not have the same privileges and access.

We can all help better our world by heeding God's call in our own lives. God's call may take his disciples on an unexpected journey to a faraway place, but just as importantly, he calls on others to help those journeying disciples through prayers and earthly gifts. I am grateful to have been affected by both. Sometimes it can be hard to see the impact that we, the Body of Christ, leave. But, by being disciples of Christ, God uses us to create a future where all can have sonrisas bonitas!

"It was very stressful for my entire immediate family. The Presbyterian Hospital in Pittsburgh had rooms available nearby for families of patients in ICU. It was such a help to my family, not only emotionally (to share stories with others) but financially."



Sharon Warren, whose late husband George was the visionary behind Hope Cottage, sees her volunteering as "an opportunity to be of service to the people and their families as they are able to be near their loved ones. It is a gift received by both the Caretakers and by the family members when we are present. It is such a nice opportunity to get to know and work with our church members. I feel closer to George and our God when I am at Hope House."



Katie Richardson, yet another Caretaker, puts it this way: "Spending time at Hope House is a blessing and a gift! Stepping foot on the grounds you are immediately embraced by the work of a team of angels. From the beautifully kept grounds to the impeccably organized system, the homemade snacks awaiting a tired, stressed Guest, and the warmth and comfort from a home atmosphere in every nook and cranny, you are aware of the amazing interaction of an incredible team of volunteers. 
