Children in Worship

Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." (Mark 10:15)

If you have not noticed, we are trying some new things in worship in the hope that our children will be drawn more deeply into this sacred practice. During our 10:30 a.m. services, Sarah Harbin-Coleman and the Children's Ministry Team are facilitating a special time of "Children's Worship," which allows kids to experience "big church" in the sanctuary or the Net before leaving to have their own, child-friendly worship time in Grace Hall. On Confirmation Sundays, our newest and youngest members are putting their newfound knowledge and faith to work by writing and leading our worship liturgies. And, next month, our MPPC Youth Group will resurrect the tradition of having young people lead an entire morning of worship, with high school seniors preaching at all services.

All of these efforts are being made as part of a sacred trust we have been given – the calling to pass the faith of Jesus Christ on to a new generation. For decades, the church watched as young men and women somewhat predictably drifted from the church in their twenties.

However, when those people began to settle down, marry, and start families, most of them -- just as predictably - found their way back to the church. They did so because they had lived enough and experienced enough to realize how formative their childhood in the church had been. They realized how much they had absorbed just by hearing scripture read from the pulpit, what a blessing a Sunday School teacher had been, or how deeply their faith had been affected by a youth mission trip. Tragically, more and more children are growing up without any of these experiences. As they age, it is highly unlikely that they will ever find the church, because they never learned, at a young and impressionable age, the power, the comfort, and the security they are missing.

I hope we will all remember these troublesome trends the next time we hear a baby fussing a bit during worship, or when a little boy down the pew can't seem to sit still. That baby is not a nuisance, but a child of the covenant. That little boy is not a distraction, but someone who is forming deep memories of faith and practice - memories that are not built on words, but around the feeling of what it means to worship God. If we are lucky, those children will be back - maybe next week, maybe next year, maybe in ten or twenty years. But I quarantee you this: they are watching us right now to see what it means to be a disciple. So, as Jesus says, "Let the little children come, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs" (Matthew 19:14).

CONNECTING TO MISSIONS

Hope House, a widowed mother, her son, and a Sunday School Class



In the early fall of this past year, a 32-year-old young man with multiple health issues entered a local hospital for treatment. Samuel has been constantly in and out of hospitals as he struggles with the same genetic illness that took his father's life at age 50.

Medical bills and living in hotels and temporary housing while searching for answers and treatment had consumed all their savings by the time Samuel was admitted. His mother, Nancy, was referred to the Hope House while Samuel was being treated. They had little left, living on her Social Security and Samuel's disability. Then a severe medical issue hit Nancy as well.

Weeks became months after checking out of Hope House with both mother and son in and out of the hospital. Motel rooms, AirBnb's, sleeping in one another's hospital rooms, all became their life style.

In November, Samuel and Nancy had found a program for extensive treatment for his medical problems at the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Florida. They returned to Jacksonville with the clothes on their backs and little else. In Jacksonville, they continued the cycle of scraping by, living day to day.

The Hope House volunteer that had checked Nancy in that morning in the early fall had stayed in touch with them and learned of their plight. She told it to her Sunday School class, the Connect Three class. "Connect Three" stands for Connecting to God, Connecting to each other, and Connecting to missions. The class saw an opportunity to serve.

In a few short weeks, the class had committed to donating all the things required to set up a "home" apartment in Jacksonville. Members volunteered to drive a large rental truck packed to the gills with couches, tables, a tv and computer, dishes, linens, pots and pans, lamps and rugs.

As Nancy would say, with the "awesome love" shown by this MPPC Christian community, she was able to lease a small apartment within their limited income that is close to Mayo and where she and Samuel will not have to live the lonely, nomadic life of motels and short term rentals...but to get a fresh start.

Nancy said, "You've given us everything to turn this small apartment into a home."

Samuel said, "Even when I go back to the hospital, I know I have this home to come back to."

With Christ's love in our hearts, even what appears at first to be too big a task to undertake can be transformed into a miracle, when we enlist the help of our Christian community. All we've got to do is to open our eyes and our hearts to see the opportunities around us every day.

Third Grade Bibles

On Sunday, March 8, our third grade class will receive bibles from our church. It is my hope that these be well-loved and well-used! We will be teaching them some skills during Sunday School during March. I also encourage our parents and guardians to help their children, and maybe get a refresher themselves! Here are some easy ways:

- Books of the Bible Games: Write these on notecards or Jenga blocks! There are 54 blocks in a Jenga set, so you'll have to group some books together. Play Jenga as normal, but call out the names of the books as you pull the blocks
- Bible Divisions: Learning the divisions of the books helps us memorize them and understand the contents.
- Memory Verses: Find a list of easy but important memory verses for kids online.
- Navigation: Teach them to use the Table of Contents.

There are lots of resources available, and I can provide other games, challenges, and opportunities for children to get to know their Bible!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As you begin reading this month's Pelican, many of you (almost 290!) are participating in the Lenten Small Group study using the book *Neighborhood Church*. Through the five-week study, co-author Rob Mueller helps congregations reflect on what it means to be a neighborhood church. While some congregations have changed more than others through the years, co-authors of *Neighborhood Church* believe each congregation has rich opportunities to explore how God might be calling them to mission. This includes Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church.

MPPC has a rich history of mission; part of our identity is that we call ourselves a missional church. We are globally and locally engaged, but we also are a different congregation than we were five years ago. Our neighborhood has changed, Charleston has changed, the country has changed, but MPPC continues to serve Christ through people's lives. Small groups this year are left with a challenge: develop and commit to a new initiative that shapes and engages the lives of people we call neighbor using assets we have in our own backyard – good things that already

exist in ourselves, in our congregation, in the community and in our neighborhood – to better serve others. And this challenge is open to the entire congregation!

While you may or may not be participating in a small group, you can engage in our study through worship. Sermons are focused on Scripture that speaks to the themes of *Neighborhood Church*. You can reach out to existing small groups; hear how they are challenged to be a neighborhood church and the initiatives they are discussing. Pray for MPPC. Volunteer your assets, things you do well, to help serve our neighbors. Most importantly, actively be the Body of Christ.

WORSHIP & MUSIC MINISTRIES


Greetings from your Worship and Music Ministries,
