## FROM THE PASTOR

## **Discerning the Spirits**

"Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God..." (1 John 4:1)

One of the struggles that every Christian must confront is the challenge of discerning the will of God. Hints and signs may seem to point in certain directions, and we try to interpret those signs as best we can. But, at the end of the day, can we really know what God is up to? And, even if we could see clearly what God is up to, how do we know that the things we are up to are really helping God? As we see in the First Epistle of John, Christians throughout the ages have sought to "test the spirits." All of us have tried our best to read the spiritual tea leaves -- to interpret the hints and signs that life gives us -- all in the hope of discerning God's will for us and for the world. It has always been, and always will be, a task limited and corrupted by human frailty. And yet we know that this is a calling for every earnest believer - the call to try our best to follow God's will in all that we

In the coming weeks, we will be called upon to "test the spirits" in new and vexing ways. We will be pressed to decide when, and how, we will gather again in person as a church and community. We are already hearing a variety of voices – a cacophony of health experts, economists, and politicians pressing competing visions of how it all should go. As the church, we will have to do our best to read and interpret these signs. But make no mistake... we will need to read them through one lens, and one lens only. We need to test these spirits as disciples of Christ... to see whether they truly are from God.

Specifically, the session will have to wrestle with tough questions like the ones that follow. As you read them, I invite you all to begin your own prayerful discernment:

- How will worship change if gatherings (worship, Sunday School meetings, etc.) are limited to specific numbers?
- How will our celebrations of baptisms and the Lord's Supper change to account for new health concerns?
- · Will we continue to pass an offering plate, or should that practice change?
- How will our cleaning and sanitation practices change?
- · Will we serve breakfast and Wednesday night meals the same way?
- What kind of new technologies will we need going forward?

This is just a small sampling of the kinds of questions we will all have to answer. As we answer them, we will have to be mature, diligent, and honestly self-reflective about the

differences between what we want personally, and what we need socially... between what we have known in the past, and what makes sense for the future... about perspectives that are based in frailty and self-interest, and those that are selfless and prioritize the needs of others

Fortunately, Christians have learned across the centuries that we have amazing resources at our disposal - resources that aid and guide us as we seek not our own will, but the will of God. God gives us direction through the Word of God, which is always a lamp unto our feet, and a light for our path (Psalm 119:105). We are also aided by **prayer**, which leads us from anxiety to peace as we present our requests to God (Phil. 4:6-7). God also brings **trusted friends and fellow believers** into our lives to help us find our way through the world (Prov. 15:22), especially when those people have studied and learned aspects of God's creation that we have not. God also gives us wisdom through the experiences of living. God has given us eyes, ears, hearts, and minds, and God expects us to use those gifts faithfully to understand the world as best we can.

Together, over the coming weeks and months, we will work together, with honesty and faith, to "test the spirits." We will read the signs that God gives us and do our best to follow God into a future that is faithful, selfless, hopeful, and true. As every disciple knows, there will be crosses to bear. But we also know that, with every cross borne in Christ, an Easter is sure to follow. May the Lord bless as we seek to do God's will!

## RISE AGAINST HUNGER









Last November, our Director of Youth Ministries, Courtney Kraus, led our youth in a Rise Against Hunger program (www. riseagainsthunger.org). Rise Against Hunger hosts packing parties where participants pack family sized, high-carb and nutrient-dense meals that get shipped all over the world for people in need. That night our youth packed over 12,000 meals. Those meals were added to other meals packed by various organizations to support Rise Against Hunger's Charlotte, NC warehouse. The number of meals grew into 285,120 meals! Those meals have been sent to Nicaragua.

due to the global pandemic and like here, there is great concern for the children and their ability to receive proper nutrition. In light of this pandemic, HOM has decided to take the 1,000's of meal kits they have in storage and distribute them to their students and their families. The children and families need the food now, not stored up in a warehouse for later. Teachers, administrators, and students came together to pack rice, beans, and cooking oil in small bags and distribute them through out the neighborhoods to their students and families.

here in the USA, schools in Haiti are closed

I am very familiar with Rise Against Hunger, as it started in Lynchburg, VA. I have sponsored several "packing parities." I have also not only seen Rise Against Hunger meals stacked floor to ceiling in large a warehouse in Port-au-Prince Haiti, but have also seen those meals feed hundreds of children each day for their school lunch. Our mission partner in Haiti, Haiti Outreach Ministries-HOM (www.haitiom.org) uses these meal kits to feed over 1,500 students on four campuses every day of the week. In many instances this is the only substantial meal these children will eat on any given day. Unfortunately, like we are experiencing


## Church is at Home, too!



Color Changing Invisible Ink

1/2 cup water

1 tbsp baking soda

Paper

Rubbing alcohol

Turmeric

Q-tips or paintbrush for first

step

Paper towels, paintbrush, or
cotton ball for last step

Add baking soda to water and stir to make your "invisible ink." Use Q-tips to draw a picture or write a message with your ink on the paper. Allow to dry while you mix turmeric and rubbing alcohol, taking care not to stain your container, counter, or clothes. Apply your solution to the dried paper and watch what happens!

## It's a Wrap...Almost!

The 2020 Lenten Small Group study of *Neighborhood Church* is behind us! As part of the small group challenge, new initiatives were developed to be better neighborhood church. The initiatives were discussed and presented during an online Zoom meeting on Wednesday, April 15, and the results are summarized below. These suggestions will be shared with appropriate ministry and committee teams. From there, the groups can discern how MPPC might integrate these initiatives into the life of the church.

Thank you to all small group facilitators and participants who helped make this year's Lenten study an "outward" experience! This experience will help define how MPPC is a *neighborhood church*!

## **Small Group Initiatives**

We recognize that we are an active congregation engaged in the community and outreach. To be neighbor includes taking care of our congregation. The following is a summary of recommended initiatives.

- Explore being a neighborhood church, neighborhoods act as an arm of the church in reaching out to and supporting members, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Get better acquainted with our congregation and our mission and ministry.
- Explore creating mentorships and sponsorships; we can share our expertise to help integrate new members into the life and ministry of the congregation.
- Consider starting a support group for caretakers of older adults.
- Reach out to existing groups using the church facilities.
  - · Alcoholics Anonymous
  - Groups like ECCO and Habitat for Humanity
  - Engage in conversations with those who use our facilities to better our relationship and share our resources
  - · Hear the stories of our guests and visitors
  - Personally invite those who use our space to attend, serve and tell their stories
- Look at the Learning Center and see if there are opportunities for the LC to expand and/or look outward as a missional component.
- Look at new ways to share our space like the physical kitchen and classrooms as well as sharing food to help with any food insecurity that is in the community
- Create listening opportunities so we can be a better neighborhood church

We have an idea and we need your help! We all have questions we might ask God. Some of the questions are from the curious, others are looking for a deep theological understanding of faith. Greetings from your Worship and Music Ministries!



## INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS

Almost a year ago in June, our children at Vacation Bible School went on a magical journey to Africa. Their journey was to visit the rural poor province of Katangi, somewhat east of the capital city of Nairobi. Our church, in partnership with Daystar University in Nairobi, had selected this community for a pilot project of raising chickens with the goal of helping alleviate poverty by producing a community run chicken farming effort.

The chickens will be raised for breeding, for local nutrition, and for commercial profit to the community.

An additional goal outlined for this project involves improving the community's quality of life through school health initiatives and education, which expose both the primary school pupils and the local secondary school students to healthy lifestyles.

Our children and their families, along with your church's mission dollars, supplied seed money for the purchase of healthy chicks and some of the critically needed equipment to begin this economically viable, self-sustaining chicken farming.

In our February report from recent Daystar graduate, Sylvia Mwia Musengele, who was vetted by the Daystar University leadership in Community Development to manage the project, reported that, "Since its inception the project has been of great help to the Katangi community. We are pleased to report that in the period under review, October 2019 to January 2020, the project has distributed 500 chicks to two different groups of 25 members each. Despite the heavy rains and a high chicks mortality accompanying such foul weather, more than 80% of these chicks survived and are growing to maturity."

The goal of our MPPC Kenya Ministry is to develop self-sustaining community projects in rural Kenya along with our Nairobi partner, the Community Development Department of Daystar University, and support of local community leaders.

The projects are carefully selected for three-year grants from MPPC to seed the efforts. Oversight is provided by Daystar as the community takes ownership of the project while our MPPC support diminishes. At the end of three years, the goal for these projects is that the community will have complete ownership of them and continue to improve their economic circumstances.



"My name is Veronica Nduku, through Sylvia our project coordinator, your church and Daystar came to us, mobilized us and through our group, they gave us chicks which have grown and multiplied, we are able to sell some and cater for family needs, not forgetting the eggs we get from them. Our children used to fall sick now and then because of poor diet. But now there is a big improvement because we are feeding them with eggs as we hatch the rest, may God bless Daystar University and their church partner from the U.S.A."

Our church in action... Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church's congregational response to the coronavirus crisis! While we are socially distancing ourselves these days, while it seems that our connecting is through Zoom, while we are worshipping on Sunday mornings by watching our computer screens and seeing the wonderful services that are put together by our MPPC staff, there is so much more that is going on! It is YOU, a fellowship of believers, who are doing God's work in many ways that are "behind the scenes."

And YOU, our congregation, continue to seek additional ways to serve:

Last summer an anonymous member of MPPC offered a challenge. The challenge was that the anonymous member would match up to \$100,000 in donations from MPPC members. The challenge was met in abundance and YOU increased the total of the funds available to over \$230,000 for non-operational, new initiatives and projects in Christ's service.

- A family called one of our pastors after reading about one of our church mission partners in dramatic need of food for the Mount Pleasant community that the agency serves and then decided to make a substantial contribution to ECCO.
- So many of YOU continue to leave bags of food at the church for ECCO or drop them off directly. Others of YOU are hands-on involved in serving there as well.
- Some of YOU have made direct monetary contributions to the Lowcountry Food Bank and some of YOU are directly involved, handson, with this agency.
- A Sunday School class...a class of YOU, has begun a class fundraiser to support the Lowcountry Food Bank.
- From the Red Cross, March 17, 2020 "We now face a severe blood shortage due to an unprecedented number of blood drive cancellations in response to the coronavirus outbreak." YOU, members of MPPC, stepped up to the plate at the end of April, hosting and donating in a Blood Drive in the Fellowship Hall.
- So many of YOU are involved in so many acts of love that are unknown except to you and God.

Over the past several months, your mission teams, both local and international, have been exploring agencies in need and how we can support them using funds from this wonderful gift. MPPC asked our partner agencies to prepare Grant Requests that our teams, staff and Session have studied.

Because of the COVID-19 crisis, many of these agencies can't fully determine how their needs will change when the crisis is over and some of our partner agencies in the community can't wait. They need immediate emergency funding for food and shelter for those they serve.

Recognizing these "can't wait" needs for so many that have fallen on hard times, made harder still by job loss and social isolation, the Session has approved a Coronavirus Response Grant for immediate distribution from this fund that YOU have so generously contributed to.

This immediate, critical needs support will be given to four high-impact local agencies with a gift of \$5,000 for each of the four. The Lowcountry Food Bank, ECCO, Florence Crittenton, and One80 Place.

## **Lowcountry Food Bank**

In the last few weeks alone, the LCFB has expended more than \$400,000 on food and transportation. In late March, the LCFB distributed more than 960,000 pounds of food through its partner agencies to those in need -- this equates to 800,000 meals. 15% of the 300 LCFB partner agencies and food pantries that deliver food directly to clients are closed, due to lack of volunteers, creating fewer locations for those who are trying to find food. Due to this, there has been a 43% increase in clients at LCFB agency partners and food pantries. Additionally, the distribution of more than 6,600 BackPacks to children who depend on free school breakfast and lunch meals that are not currently available because of school closures. The MPPC Coronavirus Response funds will make a difference in the lives of many people in these dire circumstances. ### **Florence Crittenton**

More homeless, young, pregnant women and mothers are seeking assistance at Florence Crittenton - they may have been kicked out or fled their home, they're wages were cut and can't afford their bills, or they aren't able to get into shelters (most aren't accepting new people) and are not safe on the street.

Florence Crittenton will use the MPPC Coronavirus Response funds to provide short-term housing assistance (extended-stay hotel room or security deposit/short-term rental assistance), as well as some part-time case managers to help these families navigate this challenge.
