This has been a time of changes for you and for me, changes which have already happened, and the knowledge that there are still changes yet to come. A friend of mine in ministry often said, "change is painful and difficult." I've never liked that

statement, but it isn't completely wrong. Change often comes with a sense of loss and of pain, particularly change we don't choose. The pandemic has forced us to deal with some changes out of our control, and some of those changes are very hard indeed. As I face moving boxes, a soon-to-be "empty nest," the tasks of figuring out a new community, and leaving friends, loved ones, and ministries I have loved behind, there is definitely some pain and some difficulty.

Still, the stories of our faith are stories of change, of transition, of transformation. God does not change, and yet God's children are constantly being called into changing situations. I have watched so many of you work to care for one another with grace and generosity, and have been uplifted by the dedication and determination of staff members as they seek to serve God and you.

I have been glad to get to know many companions here in faith and ministry, and I thank you for the gifts of what I have learned and how I have grown as a result of my time here. There are new changes ahead for all of us, and you and I have a choice: we can fear it, and make the idea that it is "painful and difficult" a self-fulfilling prophecy. Or, we can choose to embrace change with anticipation and joy, allowing God to continue to transform our minds and hearts, and for you, the life of the community of faith. I pray that you choose that latter, and allow God to continue to renew your hearts and minds, deepen your faith, and that all that you do be done for God's glory.

It's like God has created for us some sacred space, so we can finally go through those boxes stacked in the corners of our lives that we've known we needed to go through, but just didn't make the time to open.

Now, as we turn to what we hope is the end of this chapter of isolation and the beginning of a new chapter of being the church, I pray that we will all hear and embrace the preaching of Jesus, who said that every person who truly seeks the kingdom of heaven "is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old" (Matthew 13:52). These past months have reminded us of some amazing treasures long held. It has also given us some new skills and perspectives. May we take up the best of both, and start a new chapter together.

I leave you with the hopeful words of our own high school graduate, Molly
Bynum, from a speech that she gave to her Wando
High classmates at the end of one chapter and the beginning of another:

"... the lessons learned during these uncertain times, and throughout our lives, have been immense and inspiring. We have become the type of students -- or better yet, the type of people -- who look at a challenge and see an opportunity... people who see closed doors and try to pick the lock. While we may have had big dreams for these past few months, what really matters is what we've been able to achieve during this time. From here on out, we improvise. And while the past few months have been full of heartbreak and nostalgia, we are stronger and more prepared than before. This is our time. After all, it's now our world for the taking: what else could we be waiting for?"

Hope House Open to COVID-19 Heroes

How our lives have changed in two months. Social distancing has become the norm. School buildings closed with classes going virtual. Only now are businesses slowly beginning to reopen, with safety measures in place.

Though Hope House has been thoroughly cleaned from top to bottom, inside and out, we cannot yet check in out-of-town guests whose loved ones are in area hospitals.

However it IS open to members of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church who are medical professionals working on the frontlines of the coronavirus.

Many of them have been staying in hotels every night, so they won't expose their families to the virus

We are ever so grateful to our Missional Minister Bart Edwards for suggesting Hope House as a far less expensive alternative.

These medical professionals will be registered via telephone by Hope House director Beth Moore and given a list of do's and don'ts -- such as disinfecting their luggage before entering the House, providing their own linen, then putting it in plastic bags and taking it with them when they leave.

We encourage you to spread the word about this "new" Hope House mission -- and we hope you and your loved ones are well and staying safe during these trying times.

Summer Musings

I have a secret. I used to clown. I don't mean I "clowned" or "played" around. I was a clown. Makeup and all! When I was working on my master's degree at the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, one of my colleagues was a trained clown from a professional circus, so he taught the skills of clowning to those who wanted to learn – but it was about being a Christian clown. There is a difference. In the circus you are a performer and your purpose is to entertain, sometimes to distract. In Christian clowning, the colors are symbolic, and our message is both entertainment and to share the Good News of the Gospel.

For more than thirty years I clowned at different times. The most memorable – once you got through the youngest child's fear – was knowing people of all ages connected to your message. When a child comes up to you and asks, "Why did you make me cry? The story was sad for a while." You can have a conversation with her. Equally memorable is clowning in a foreign country where culture and language are barriers to communication. There is no barrier in clowning; the language is mime!

I mention clowning because I had to step out of my comfort zone to learn something new. Once I did, I thoroughly enjoyed it and felt blessed to use Christian clowning as a vehicle to share the Good News of the Gospel. The first disciples of Jesus followed Jesus having no idea what was to come except that they wanted to learn from Jesus himself. Their comfort was in Jesus, not in how to do ministry. Today, disciples at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church are called to step out of our comfort zone and share the Gospel in all that we do.



I wonder, in the midst of a pandemic, what we learn about our faith and the place God has in our heart. We may find ourselves in unchartered territory as we literally become our child's teacher, teaching subject matter we don't remember. We haven't worshipped on our physical campus for more than 2 months. Some of us haven't seen family or traveled away from home during COVID-19.

These places of unfamiliarity are okay, though. It's how we can grow. I hope, through the pandemic, we have opened and read our Bible more, prayed for our neighbors, and worshipped on-line. I hope we have become attuned to the disparity in our world and that each of us needs to make a difference. I hope we have a new, creative sense of Church, and are looking for ways we can BE THE CHURCH. The opportunities to serve are plentiful. How would you like to serve in our new normal?

Greetings from your Worship and Music Ministries!

This time apart has been challenging for everyone. For musicians who love to express themselves through the beauty

of music it has been difficult. For church musicians who regularly express their love of God through this blessed vehicle it has been especially hard. I have been in regular contact with choir members – frequent group emails, calls, personal emails, even a Zoom baby shower. We have experimented with remote recordings and used an app to bring everyone's individual sounds together. All of it was a good beginning and intermediate step, a way to stay connected, but it is not the same as being together. (It's actually quite intimidating to record oneself – not for the faint of heart!)

I've heard from so many of our member musicians about how much they miss being together to make music and share their joys and concerns. Everyone understands the need to be separated, but I think this time has brought a new comprehension of what it means to be in a musical ensemble whether it is vocal choir or bell choir or brass ensemble at Easter. One choir member said she had occasion to briefly be in the church building. She found herself standing in the empty choir room "...missing everyone and just praying we will all be back





together soon. I've realized that a big part of my life revolves around music...always knew that but especially now when it's gone it really hits home - can't wait to have it all back!" Another choir member expressed his longing by telling me that this Easter was the first time in decades he had not been singing in the choir loft. It is as if a hole has opened in their lives.

When our Fine Arts Ministry Team made the difficult decision to postpone the final event in the Village Concert Series and cancel the 13th year of our annual Arts Camp for Children it was with heavy hearts. These occasions add to the life and rich fabric of our church and without them we feel somewhat less than before

However, knowing our hope is in the Lord we forge ahead. This time will come to an end and we will be back together to make new memories, share our lives and sing our praise to God in person. May we come out of this with a new appreciation for all the gifts God has given to us:

NEW STEPHEN MINISTERS

Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. (Galatians 6:2)

Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church offers Stephen Ministry, a one-on-one, Christ-centered caring ministry for the congregation and the community. On May 24, five new Stephen Ministers were commissioned during worship after completing 17 weeks of training. We caught up with Margaret Agee, Chris Hulsey, Tom Osterhaus, Joe Rainero, and Cathy Worrall to ask them about the training experience and their hopes as they undertake this important ministry.

Q: What sparked your initial interest in Stephen Ministry?

CW: Now that my husband and I are emptynesters I have more time for outside-work activities and wanted to get more involved in the church. I have always been involved in the Music Ministries (choir, handbells). Stephen Ministry allows me to serve the church, its members and the community in a different way. I also felt that the training would help me better support my students in my role at work.

CH: I was drawn to it as another avenue of service to others, a way to benefit someone in need.

Q. What aspect of the training did you find most helpful or interesting?

CW: The aspect of the training I found most interesting was ministering to those experiencing grief. We discussed many types of loss, not just death, and ways that others can make it hard to grieve.

MA: The 20 week training has hopefully made me a better listener and helped me understand that I can be the CAREgiver, while God is the CUREgiver.

Q: Our Stephen Ministry training had to adapt when the pandemic unexpectedly changed our intended group training experience. Tell us what the experience of virtual Zoom training sessions was like for you.

JR: Using Zoom was a great way to continue with our training during stay-at-home orders, but it was also difficult because it happened just about in the middle of our training schedule. I was used to being with all the others in class every week, and I missed that part of it.

Q: What are you most looking forward to as you being your service as a Stephen Minister?

CH: I'm looking forward to how God will use me as a conduit to help my Care Receiver, knowing that He is the Cure Giver. I'm also excited to see how my faith will mature along this journey.

JR: I'm really looking forward to giving spiritual strength to someone in need and seeing how Jesus works in their lives.

Q: What would you wish for the congregation at MPPC to know about Stephen Ministry?

MA: That Stephen Ministers are a confidential, listening group of men and women who can help when someone needs it, for church members and for the community.

CW: I would like the congregation to know that asking for help is not a sign of weakness. It takes a lot of strength to reach out for assistance. Stephen Ministry offers a compassionate, Christ-centered, listening ear in times of need.

MISSION IN ACTION

Putting Your MPPC Congregation Challenge Grant & International Mission Funds Into Action

There are many impoverished countries that do not have government programs or social services widely available to provide for the needs of their poor citizens. Those that are desperate for help depend greatly on the generosity of local ministries in their communities for food and basic needs during a crisis like our world is facing.

The best way for MPPC to help is to give the gift of money so our International Mission Partners who are out there on the front lines can distribute what is needed most to those less fortunate.

The MPPC International Missions Team has identified seven of our international partners that are in critical need of food, medical supplies

and basic hygiene supplies. In addition to our International Missions budgeted funds, your Challenge Grant Funds have been approved by the Session for emergency COVID-19 related relief for four of these missional partners. In addition, two of these agencies, LAMB and Haiti Outreach Ministries, have had their original, pre-virus, Grant Requests approved, putting local people to work on critical-need buildings that will serve their communities.

We have been truly blessed with the MPPC Challenge Grant Funds and your MPPC pledges so that we can reflect God's love in a troubled world, especially in this time of crisis!

Here is how YOUR giving is making a difference internationally:

AMOS Health and Hope/La Danta, Nicaragua addresses the problems of poverty, disease and preventable deaths by improving the health and well-being of people who suffer from conditions of deep poverty. AMOS responds to community-identified needs and then builds upon the strengths of the community by working alongside then in health, education and leadership development. MPPC's COVID-19 relief will help AMOS provide ongoing training of Health Promoters in remote communities by equipping them with educational materials about COVID-19 to keep themselves and the community members they serve in the clinics safe. AMOS will also deliver food supplements and vitamins to families in need. Due to the pandemic, remote communities have been reporting shortages of food items and price increases of items that are available.

Daystar University/Nairobi, Kenya, a long-time partner of MPPC, provides a Christian education for students from all over Africa. Our church has sponsored scholarships to Daystar students for many years. Because of COVID-19, Daystar has closed its doors and sent all students home. The university is working to continue teaching via online instruction, but not all students have access to the internet. Some do not have the funds to travel back home. Your support will be used to provide protective gear and sanitizer for students, to feed and care for students on campus, and to provide internet access to students who could not attend online classes.

Habitat Honduras/LaCeiba, Honduras (HH)

MPPC has been sending a mission team each year to HH. The team builds a house alongside the family who will occupy the home when it's complete. In light of COVID-19, most construction has been halted on their projects. They are forecasting a 60% reduction in donations which assures that many of their projects will be delayed. All mission trips have been cancelled causing some severe food shortages in the smaller villages. When asked their immediate need, HH has indicated that general operating support is needed so they can continue to pay their employees for what is expected to be a prolonged shutdown. They're also trying to fund protective equipment purchases for use by their employees to keep them safe. The gifts sent by MPPC will help them maintain some continuity in their operations as they manage their way through this unprecedented situation.

Palmetto International Missions/Copan, Honduras (PIM) MPPC has worked with PIM for years, sending building and medical mission teams to Honduras. Confirmed cases and deaths from COVID-19 have

Confirmed cases and deaths from COVID-19 have risen in Honduras. Canario, outside the city of Copan Ruinas, is a place where MPPC volunteers have built houses and set up medical clinics. The community receives no government assistance as they face food shortages and a critical need for basic necessities. Your gift will be sending food relief to families in Canario as well as support to Trinidad and villages around Copan Ruinas.

MISSION IN ACTION

The Kinyago Dandora Schools/Nairobi, Kenya (KDS) The KDS schools lie in the most impoverished slum in Nairobi and are a lifeline for the children and their families. These families are among the most vulnerable citizens in Nairobi. A majority of families live in homes made of sticks and mud with no windows, water, electricity or sanitation. Six to eight people live in a room. There is usually only one bed and children sleep on gunny sacks on the ground. There is no money for proper nutrition, healthcare or school fees. Many children work long hours at hard, even dangerous, jobs to help provide for their families. Your support will provide nutritional and healthcare needs for the KDS students, families and staff.

Haiti Outreach Ministries/Port-au-Prince, Haiti (HOM) has been in Haiti for 25 years. Their work is focused on education, healthcare, worship, and the development of community. This is a new partner for MPPC - though Rev. Bart has worked with them for fifteen years! We had planned our first mission trip later in 2020. Sadly, that has been cancelled. Each day in Haiti, food shortages and absence of basic needs become more significant. Currently, many people that HOM serves have little to no means of buying food and providing for their families. HOM has acquired and built four campus locations with each campus housing a church, school, health clinic and a well for safe water. The HOM Challenge Grant Request that the Session has approved will put people to work. They will be working on a fifth campus that houses an economic development and job training program that's desperately needed in Port-au-Prince.

LAMB Institute/Tegucigalpa, Honduras educates, protects, empowers and cares for those suffering from extreme poverty, abuse, and exploitation. COVID-19 has forced most Honduran businesses to close and has restricted movement around the cities. Each day, food shortages grow and the absence of basic needs becomes more dire. LAMB has also been providing food for families, single moms and elderly residents in the area. LAMB has 86 employees, many of whom are working to help the less fortunate in their own communities. LAMB is also supporting health care workers by sending masks and cots to hospitals with no supplies. Your MPPC gifts are helping provide supplies for the food bank and helping respond to the daily needs of those who God has called to continue in service in Tegucigalpa.

In addition, the LAMB Challenge Grant request that has been approved will put people to work, building a large multi-use structure to support children who are graduating from the school, but will not have a traditional way forward.



Here is how YOUR giving is making a difference locally:

Last month our Session approved Challenge Grant Funds for immediate critical COVID-19 related needs going to four of our local missional partners to help relieve the drastic pressures they are facing. Those agencies that received funds are ECCO, Florence Crittenton, One80 Place and The Lowcounty Food Bank. This month, an additional critical need has been brought forward. East Cooper Meals on Wheels (ECMOW), our long-time missional partner, has been approved by the Session to receive aid from your Challenge Grant Funds.

ECMOW's homebound meal recipients, around 400 in number, are continuing to need their meals! In normal times, ECMOW provides many volunteers that prepare and deliver meals.

Because of the virus, they have only their staff of seven people to replace the over 100 volunteers that normally prepare hot food for delivery to the ECMOW recipients. This is for the safety of both volunteers and recipients.

Since they are unable to prepare hot meals, they must buy frozen meals from nonprofit agencies like the Lowcountry Food Bank and Senior Catering at around \$3 per meal. A week's worth of frozen meals are then delivered once per week, instead of the daily deliveries. Your Challenge Grant emergency relief money will be spent directly on the frozen meals that are kept in the ECMOW freezers until distributed. Thank you for blessing our MPPC missions with your support!
