FROM THE PASTOR

World Communion Sunday

For as in one body we have many members... so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. (Romans 12:4-5)

On an otherwise unremarkable Sunday in 1933, the Rev.

Dr. Donald Craig made his way to the Lord's Table.
Standing before the faithful of Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, he began the communion liturgy in a fairly ordinary way. It did not take long,

however, for the congregation to realize that this would be no ordinary service. On that day, an idea that germinated in the congregation's Stewardship Committee was, for the first time, given flesh and voice in the breaking of the bread and the pouring of the cup. That committee had pondered how they might promote and celebrate the ties that bind all Christian churches of the world together in unity and common purpose. To that end, Dr. Craig referenced in his communion liturgy the thousands upon thousands of congregations all over the globe who would be remembering and observing the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on that Lord's Day. The recognition that so many people, in so many places, were united in common cause around common tables was deeply felt by all who were in worship that morning.

It took only three years for that power to spread throughout the Presbyterian Church in the United States. By 1940, the body that later became the National Council of Churches began promoting "World Communion Sunday" to houses of faith all over the world. And, even as the world descended into the terrible conflict of World War II, more and more churches began to see the value of taking a day – at least one

day per year – to stop what they were doing and remember that they have brothers and sisters all over the world who all have something amazing in common: the power and presence of the bread of life and the cup of salvation.

As we always do, we will share this worldwide observance on the first Sunday of October. That day, as I see it, cannot come quickly enough. Painful events at home and abroad suggest that the need for unity in Christ may be greater today than ever before. We desperately need to be reminded that we are one, even as differences in race, ethnicity, economics, and politics tear at the fabric of society. We need to embrace once again the truth spoken by Dr. King, who preached that we are all "caught in an inescapable network of mutuality" and are all tied together "in a single garment of destiny."

Fortunately, this strange year has already taught us that tables separated by physical distance can still be mystically connected through the power of the Holy Spirit. In many ways, this seems the perfect year to join our hearts together with people all across the globe and celebrate together a simple meal that changed the world.

WORSHIP CONNECTIONS

Outdoor Worship Services in October

We have some exciting news to share with you! On Sept. 22, the Session approved the recommendation made to begin outdoor worship services.

In addition to our live-streamed Sunday service, which will continue to be broadcast live at 10 a.m., we will also offer a weekly in-person service at 8:15 a.m. from the Fellowship Hall porch. These porch services, which begin on Sunday, Oct. 4th, will include an abbreviated liturgy of prayer, scripture, and the same sermon that will be given in the live-streamed service. An anthem or instrumental music will also be offered. Parking will be available on the streets and adjacent to the Seabrook Building, but we ask that the unpaved lot next to the Fellowship Hall and the spaces near the driveway circle be left empty because we hope you all will be sitting there!

Because we remain committed to health and safety as the pandemic continues, the session has instituted special protocols for these outdoor worship services. **Social distancing quidelines include:**

- Maintaining a minimum of 6 feet distance from people who are not part of your family or who have not quarantined with you;
- Bringing and wearing a face mask at all times (not provided by the church); and
- Bringing your own chairs to sit in (not provided by the church).

While we hope that use will be kept to a minimum, restrooms in the Fellowship Hall will be available on an emergency basis. Children must be accompanied by an adult; only one person or one parent/child combo will be allowed in at a time. We also ask that you sanitize the restroom on your way in and way out by using the wipes and hand sanitizer provided. Should the forecast indicate inclement weather, a cancellation email will be sent out ahead of time.

For safety reasons, we will not be celebrating sacraments in porch worship, but Elders will be present to welcome you all back, assist with questions, and ensure that social distancing guidelines are followed.


We are thrilled to be able to take this important step toward gathering together in person once more. We can't wait to greet you on October 4th!

Faith Formation and Mission

"This isn't good," my friend told me as we walked back to our flat in Odessa, Ukraine. We had just taken an orphan to her grandmother's house and were dropped off by a cab blocks from where we needed to be. It was dark and we walked with some urgency to get back to our lodging before something unexpected happened, but it was too late. Two Ukrainian police started to follow us. In a matter of minutes, they shouted in Russian, "Stop!"

"Do you have identification?" they asked. I gave them my passport; my friend had no ID. And so, the interrogation began. My friend spoke broken Russian and could understand most of what they asked. "Where are you going?" "Why are you out walking?" "Why are you here?" "Do you have any drugs?" The police talked among themselves, handed me my passport, and said, "Have a good night!" as they turned and walked back from where they came.

As we cautiously continued our walk back to our flat, my friend told me, "We were lucky tonight! Usually they want a bribe before letting someone go."

A couple of days later as we were eating supper in a local bar, Vinny, the leader of our team, sat with two prostitutes. They ate, had conversation, and before the meal was over, he "hired" them, but not in the sense one might expect. He paid their rate for the night and told them to go home, keeping them off the street and safe for twenty-four hours.

While these encounters were not on my radar for our mission trip to Ukraine to help children in an orphanage, they did leave lasting impressions. Sometimes mission work can be dangerous. Other times, we might encounter a "God moment," where an action we do can impact someone's life beyond those lives we intentionally came to serve.

Mission work is not restricted to traveling to another country. It can and does happen in our backyard. From collecting food for ECCO to helping a family move to Florida to having guests stay in Hope House, mission opportunities are many. And while we do meet for Bible study and small groups, an integral part of these gatherings and groups is outreach and service. Faith Formation is practiced outside the walls of MPPC, and those relationships are powerful and engage entire classes.

As we gather this fall for Faith Formation, remember part of being Christian means to serve. Serving is part of our transformation, and it also connects us as Christians, members of MPPC, and the greater Church. If your small group or Faith Formation group is not engaged in mission, we can connect you to an opportunity in which your group can serve. Let me know if I can help your group connect through service and mission.

Three Opportunities Each Week For Children's Faith Formation

Weekly Video Lessons

These lessons are set up to provide the learning, music, and activities of traditional Sunday School, accessible anytime by video. Kids should expect television showlength videos that they can watch while completing the activities included. Our incredible MPPC elementary teachers are hard at work creating their lessons each week. These are combined with the brand new Celebrate Wonder curriculum to make 20 minute "shows" for your children to watch. Activity sheets and video links are sent out each week, and you may also pick up activity books in the church office. Our playlist on YouTube is accessible anytime!

· Breakfast & Bibles

This weekly Zoom gathering before worship has become so sweet and important to our kids. We spend 30 minutes checking in, praying, and learning the Bible lesson that immediately follows during the worship service. Our children are invited to bring their breakfast and even wear their pajamas if the mood strikes! The Zoom code is sent out each week in Children's Ministry update emails.

LOGOS & Angel Notes

Our rehearsing children's choirs are now with Ms. Barbara each week! Angel Notes (Preschool) practices at 5 p.m., and LOGOS Choir (Elementary) practices at 5:30 p.m. LOGOS Bible study, recreation, and activities are sent out Wednesday mornings and both LOGOS and Angel Notes are invited to a Zoom that includes the lesson, recreation, and fellowship on Wednesday evenings. A Child Sponsorship Challenge for the month of October from Pastor Bart and the MPPC Missions Team:

Tis' the "Back to School" season for everyone in some shape or form with Kindergartens, schools, college, and even our own Rally Day kick off. The reality for many of our children and grandchildren is that families are adjusting to new schedules and routines. This is also true of our brothers and sisters around the globe. Our International Missions Team has received correspondence from our mission partners telling us how they are handling school and COVID protocols. Education is an integral part of life for everyone but for many it is a daily challenge. In the developing countries where we do most of our mission work, public education is not possible. The systems of government are often broken and underfunded. Many times, the only way for a child to go to school is through a private school and/or a sponsorship.

Sponsorship is something many of you are already familiar with as you



currently sponsor children in other countries. Our family sponsors a young boy in Haiti named Sendley.

Sendley goes to school through one of our mission partners, Haiti Outreach Ministries (HOM). For \$35 a month Sendley receives school uniform, his school supplies, medical and dental checkups plus daily vitamins, receives one or two meals a day, and receives an excellent Christian based education. The public school system in Haiti is, for the most part, nonexistent and not

available to most children. If it wasn't for outside organizations such as HOM, there would not be an educational opportunity for Sendley. When I travel to Haiti with a mission team, I get to visit Sendley at his school and bring him gifts and additional supplies. We started sponsoring Sendley when he was in Pre-K, now he is in the 2nd grade! Seeing him smile as he recognizes us is a wonderful way to be greeted in Haiti. Our family looks forward to these visits and being a part of Sendley's life as he grows and matures. We hope and pray for him a bright future and an opportunity for him to help his community prosper one day. The cofounder of HOM Jacky Dorleans says, "there are three ways to solve the current crisis in Haiti: Education, Education and Education!"

Most of our International Mission Partners offer some form of school sponsorship. I hope you and your family will consider sponsoring a child! One of the great benefits of sponsoring a child through one of church supported mission partners is the opportunity to build a relationship with a child. Additionally, you might be able to meet your sponsored child on a mission trip or send special gifts to him or her through the mission teams that travel to visit our mission partners. If you have questions about any of our mission partnerships, please ask me or one of our mission team participants. All our mission partners are thoroughly vetted and reviewed yearly.

I hope that each of you will spend some time over the next couple of days and weeks to pray over how you might support one of God's children in need. The problems of the world seem overwhelming at times but for a small amount (\$35-\$50) a month, you can change a child's life, change a community, and change the world. My goal is for MPPC is to

sponsor 50 children this fall! Will you join me in supporting and sponsoring the many children around the world that need a sponsor? I hope and pray you will. If you will, please let me know when you sponsor a child or if you already are sponsoring a child. I would love to share in the coming months the many ways our MPPC family is sponsoring children.
