## The Greatest Story Ever Told

Dear Church Family,



now we enter the time of Advent as we journey toward Christmas, to the greatest story ever told! You know the story, a man in a red suit climbs down your chimney and brings you gifts! No, not that story. Maybe the story of over doing, over spending and exhausting ourselves? No, it's not that story either (trust me, that is not the greatest story ever told!) The

birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christthat is the greatest story ever told!

Several years ago, I heard about a group of pastors who came together to help their churches and their communities remember the story of Jesus' birth, "the reason for the season." They called their project the Advent Conspiracy (adventconspiracy.org). Their project stands as a reminder that Christmas can still change the world and invites us to be a part of it by celebrating Christmas differently.

Here are the four tenets of their conspiracy and ways in which we can join in.

**Worship Fully**- We strive to worship fully by keeping our focus on Jesus and participating with him in what he came to do, bring HOPE to a desperate world.

Attend worship services (in person or virtual) when and where you are able, if you are traveling, to worship with your friends and family wherever you are, making it part of your trip.

**Spend Less**- We spend less by resisting the cultural pressure to celebrate Advent and Christmas through overspending and over consumption.

Cut back on your spending, give meaningful gifts from the heart. You do not have to overdo.

Give More- We give relationally to offer one another presence, rather than merely presents.

Give to a charity of your choice. Use our Wise Giving program as a way to give. Visit someone who is alone, help someone in need or assist someone who may struggle to prepare or decorate for Christmas.

Love All- We take the money we save and LOVE ALL by giving to those in true need. Love the forgotten, the poor, marginalized, and the sick in the way Jesus asked us to.

We were designed to love, as Jesus loved us. Go, let your love and light shine!

The good news of Advent is not that we are faithful in our waiting (we often are not!) but that God is faithful in his coming. Let us begin the season of Advent a bit differently this year. conspire with me and others to remember what Christmas is truly about, and strive to tell the Good News of a Savior who comes to love us and be with us. Let's begin by loving one another and spending time together.



## **Telling Our Stories**

The writers in both the Gospel of Matthew and Luke begin with the genealogy of Jesus. If you do not know who some of the characters are, reading name after name is tedious. The ancestors, however, help give context to Jesus, whose he was, the fulfillment of prophecy, and who he was. The rest of these two Gospels, combined with Mark and John, give us a clear understanding of who Jesus was and what he came to do. Those are stories we do not forget!

Several years ago, a childhood friend did my family's genealogy on my dad's side. I was hoping to discover something exciting, like being related to a former president, a western trailblazer, a prominent immigrant, or someone noteworthy in history. Those pieces eluded my ancestors but just the same, my ancestors were important, and they left their mark for generations to come.

At the Presbyterian Older Adult Ministry Network conference this past October, one of the presenters talked about leaving our legacy. With vast technology at our fingertips, our tools for leaving our story to our children are tremendous. We can take pictures and videos, create a digital storybook, or author a novel (okay, a short story), yet I wonder how many of us take time to tell our story. (If you are interested in learning more about how you can create a memory book, contact me!)

Whether we are documenting our story or leaving our narrative to oral tradition, each day we are alive we draft our story. This Advent, consider the story you write. One of the most powerful, authentic acts you can do to add to your story is give someone else the gift of your love. Through words and action, tell someone you love them. Tell them they are important. Tell them that God loves them, too. Through acts of love, those are the greatest pieces of our story we write. And THAT can change the world!

## **Advent Studies**

Three of our Sunday morning adult small groups are using an Advent study this season. Here is a quick look at the studies if you would like to get involved and participate!

Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas, by Adam Hamilton. His parents gave him the name Jesus. But the prophets, the shepherds, the wise men, and the angels addressed him by other names. They called him Lord, Messiah, Savior, Emmanuel, Light of the World, and Word Made Flesh. Best-selling author Adam Hamilton examines the names of Christ used by the gospel writers, exploring the historical and personal significance of his birth. (Academy of Saint John, SB 206, 9:30 a.m. with Zoom option)

The Journey: Walking the Road to Bethlehem, by Adam Hamilton. In The Journey, Adam Hamilton travels from Nazareth to Bethlehem in a fascinating look at the birth of Jesus Christ. As he did with

Jesus' crucifixion in 24 Hours That Changed the World, Hamilton once again approaches a world-changing event with thoughtfulness. Using historical information, archaeological data, and a personal look at some of the stories surrounding the birth, the most amazing moment in history will become more real and heart-felt as you walk along this road. (Connect 3, GH 223/225, 10:00 a.m.)

Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent, by Amy-Jill Levine. Advent is not only the perfect time to read the story of the birth of Jesus; it's also a great time to dive deeper into the biblical texts that surround the event. In the book, author, professor, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine shows how the Gospel narratives connect to the Old Testament; highlights the role of women in first-century Jewish culture; and emphasizes the importance of Mary's visitation, the census, the stable, the star of Bethlehem, and the flight to Egypt. And this month marks fours years since Gene Talbott received a new kidney. He and his wife Karen recently wrote:




## Wondering

## **Year End Giving Announcement**

The ministries of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church are dependent upon your financial generosity. Thank you for your participation in the church's mission through your tithes and offerings. As we wind down 2021 and you prepare to give during November and December, here are a few items of note:


- 1. There are several ways to give, including cash, check, via a charitable trust, directly from your 401(K) account, online via ACH or credit card, or via stock transfer. If you're giving online, please note it is less expensive for the church if you use ACH (bank account and routing number).
- 2. If you wish for your gift to be included on your 2021 giving statement, please be sure to begin the process by mid-December, especially for gifts of stock and 401(K) distributions. It takes several days for your broker to complete a stock transfer to our Morgan Stanley account, and generally a few weeks to process a 401(K) or charitable trust distribution.
- 3. If you plan to mail a gift, it must be at MPPC or postmarked by December 31, 2021. You are encouraged to mail earlier rather than later due to possible USPS delays. If your gift is post-marked or dropped off after December 31, your gift will not post to your 2021 giving statement.
