My Friends,



Thank you all for the friendly welcome Annette and I have received. It exceeds everything we have experienced thus far in any

congregation! We are looking forward to getting to know y'all better and working to create space at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church for everyone who is looking for a spiritual home.

We are certainly living in interesting times to say the least. Our son recently had some symptoms of the Omicron variant and he said to me that he felt "dirty" and didn't want to talk to people at work. Our son is truly a "people-person" so it was very surprising that he no longer felt comfortable interacting with his coworkers. After this conversation with him, I began to really understand first-hand just how great the impact of the pandemic can be on our relationships.

We've essentially had to relearn how to be social with one another, and in the future. I believe that we'll have to be even more intentional in order to connect with those around us. We must allow ourselves the freedom to visit with others when we are healthy, and trust that people who have symptoms of whatever infectious disease, even as minor as a cold, will tell us.

Maybe this is a new calling, to work on trusting each other, and for us even more so as people who have been called to follow the Messiah. Jesus our Lord.

In 1527, Martin Luther understood our calling as believers when he wrote the following regarding the bubonic plague:

"I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I shall fumigate, help purify the air, administer medicine, and take it. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance infect and pollute others, and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me, and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor needs me. however. I shall not avoid place or person, but will go freely."

Intergenerational Kickoff Sunday, Feb. 27, 4-5:30 p.m.



About the Book:

This year we use the book Seven Words: Listening to Christ from the Cross, by Susan Robb, as our Lenten small group study. Robb says, "Jesus's last words, uttered as he was dying on Good Friday, offer us the opportunity to lean in and listen



closely for messages that are for us. These statements, collected from the various Gospel accounts, have traditionally been called the seven last words of Jesus. It is particularly important to listen to them during Lent because Jesus calls on us to go on the same journey that led him to Golgotha.

According to the Gospel writers, he made that call graphically, painfully explicit: 'If any want to become my followers, let them ... take up their cross and follow me' (Mark 8:34). To hear Jesus's dying words as guideposts for our own journey is to reclaim the power of the words to two beautiful hymns: 'Must Jesus bear the cross alone, / and all the world go free? / No, there's a cross for everyone, / and there's a cross for me.' Christ's words become, for us, not merely dying words but words that show us how to live. They point the way as we seek to carry out the mission that we undertake when we commit to follow him and 'Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim / till all the world adore his sacred name.'" - (Robb, Introduction Seven Words. Page 10)

Children's Wednesday at the Well





Many times, the volunteers are the only people guests have to talk to. We try hard to be good listeners, to show compassion and understanding

for each person we meet. This is the link in the chain that connects volunteers to the ministry. It gives volunteers the desire to return for another shift. Hope House volunteer positions have been easily filled year after year. Many have been involved in the ministry since our doors opened.

Now, because of the ongoing pandemic, our list of volunteers is shorter.



We need help! We have multiple ways in which one can volunteer. Some require no contact with guests, such as the grounds keeper. Our loving and devoted Rhetta Moore, who kept our planters full of flowers and prayer garden beautiful, has moved away to be closer to her Mother. Some help stock our freezer with meals for our guests, so they don't have to worry about the high cost of restaurants in our area. Some help with financial support. The Caretaker position has several openings.

We have very flexible shifts. Sign up calendars are sent out at the end of each month and you can choose morning or afternoon shifts, once a week or once a month. We also have openings for Team Leaders who coordinate guests registration through the hospital case managers. If you are looking for



Needs include the food preparation team, set up team, hospitality team, two different overnight shifts from 10 p.m.-2 a.m. and 2-6 a.m., and then the breakdown team. Volunteers are background checked prior to serving. In addition, there is a need for men's coats and warm hats. No other clothing is needed at this time. Meet Our Guest Preacher on Feb. 27th

We are privileged to welcome the Rev. Paul Timothy Roberts, President of Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary, as our guest preacher on February 27. A native of Stamford, CT, Paul grew up in Bradenton, FL. He graduated from Princeton University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Architecture and African American Studies and worked in the business sector in New York City for eight years. He earned his M.Div. from the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, GA. From 1997 through 2010, he served as pastor of Church of the Master (PCUSA), a church founded in 1965 in Atlanta, GA, as an intentionally interracial congregation.

Under Paul's leadership, JCSTS has redefined itself—and is helping redefine theological education and expanding social justice understanding in the process. An historically Black, Presbyterian-affiliated, theological seminary with a distinguished 154-year record of service to the church, JCSTS began to experience significant declines in enrollment in the early 2000s. With low enrollment during the fall of 2010, the seminary's closure seemed imminent.

Paul's first order of business upon being named President in 2010 was to build a new institutional culture one that is welcoming to persons with no regard to race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, or class; seeks and engages in ecumenical partnerships; is not risk-averse; and adapts readily to the



changing circumstances of church and society. Bolder moves followed as Paul reconstituted the seminary's board of trustees, declined previous affiliations with unimaginative agencies, discontinued the Master of Divinity degree, launched a new online platform, and centered the seminary's educational program around liberation theology and social justice. Today, Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary advances communities of faith, justice, and compassion through innovation in theological education. Hundreds of people now engage annually in the seminary's affordable, justice-oriented programs.
