Letting Go



Last month I wrote about the fact that change (which is situational) is different from a

transition (which is a three-phase psychological reorientation process). The three phases are the ending, the neutral zone and the new beginning.

Endings are difficult. We all have something(s) we are attached to – whether it be realities, an identity, "the way we have always done something", a person we like (the previous pastor), past good times (which are often recreated to fit our memories—e.g. the stellar growth under Rev. Steve Eason), and things we have loved so much (early morning breakfasts prepared by "our own chef"). Yet, a new beginning hardly ever works if there is not a good and proper ending.

Letting go results in loss. Think about it.

People don't really resist change, but they resist losing the things they treasured. They remember good times, and forget the struggles. They know how they have mastered the ability to do something well, and are uncertain if they will be able to master a new way of doing things.

Add to that that we know what we have now, but nobody can really promise us or give us a guarantee of what we will have.

It is only if we are willing to let go of our attachments and enter the neutral zone. The neutral zone is in a time and state of being in which the old behaviors and attitudes are evaluated and die out, and people prepare to move on in a new direction.

What are the things—the myths and legends, the good times, the wonderful pastors—to which Mount Pleasant are attached? What are the things that are often more important to us than anything else?

The Messiah is Among You

This story was part of a sermon last month and several of you have asked to hear it again.

THERE WAS ONCE an old monastery tucked away in the middle of a forest. For many years people would make a significant effort required to seek out this monastery. The peaceful spirit of the place was healing for the soul.

In recent years, however, fewer and fewer people were making their way to the monastery. The monks had grown jealous and petty in their relationships with one another, and this animosity began to be felt by those who visited.

The abbot of the monastery was distressed by what was happening and poured out his heart to a wise old Jewish rabbi who came for a week of solitude and prayer in a nearby cottage in the woods. Having heard the abbot's tale of woe, he asked if he could offer a suggestion. "Please do" responded the abbot. "Anything you can offer."

The rabbi said that he had received a vision while the abbot was pouring out his heart, and the vision was this: "The Messiah is among you."

The abbot was astounded. Someone among his own community was the Messiah! Who could it be? He knew it wasn't him, but who? He hastened back to the monastery and shared the news with his fellow monks.

The monks grew silent as they looked at each other. Was this one the Messiah? Or was it that one? Or perhaps it was...? From that day on, the mood in the monastery changed. They began to treat each other with extraordinary respect. Jacob and Johannes started speaking to each other again, neither wanting to be guilty of slighting the Messiah. Paolo and Matthias left behind their frostv anger and sought out each other's forgiveness. The monks began looking for little ways of serving each other, opportunities to assist, seeking healing and forgiveness where offense had been given.

One traveler, then another began to find their way to the monastery. Word soon spread about the remarkable new spirit of the place. People found themselves renewed and transformed. They sensed a new spirit, the aura of extraordinary respect that now began to surround the old monks, and seemed to radiate out from them and permeate the atmosphere of the abbey. All because those monks knew the Messiah was among them.

Monthly, a cohort of educators and pastors gathers via Zoom to talk about and share gleanings from a topic or book we read. This month's book is worth reading! The book is Rehearsing Scripture: Discovering God's Word in Community, by Anna Carter Florence. She helps readers of all backgrounds see and hear scripture in a way that engages our mind and being. It invites us into community as we discover a text and its life application. From faithandleadership.com we read.

In her new book, Rehearsing Scripture: Discovering God's Word in Community, Florence, the Peter Marshall Professor of Preaching at Columbia Theological Seminary, draws on the world of theater to offer specific tools for reading and rehearsing Scripture in groups.

Studying scripts with other students in a theater class in college, Florence discovered that the work wasn't about being the smartest or most talented or coming up with the best interpretation.

"It was about hanging in there with each other, because the text and what we were creating with it was so interesting, nobody wanted to stop," she said. "We kept seeing where it could lead and how the questions it raised were so much bigger than we ever anticipated."

So too with Scripture -- only more so, Florence said. "It is this text that continues to give and give and give."

Springtime...when our gardens are blooming and the warmer temperatures lift our spirits and fill our hearts with joy.



MPPC's Missional Donations to Habitat for Humanity Honduras at Work!

Dear Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church,

On behalf of each of the 33 thousand families that have been benefited in Honduras with decent and affordable housing, Habitat for Humanity Honduras extends a cordial thanks for your economic support of USD\$ 3860.00, which has allowed us to leverage and expand our work through the whole country supporting families like Antonia's. Your support means a new hope for families who had lost it, as a result of the emergency caused by COVID-19, helping the native communities with more than 1800 solutions in areas where the 22% of the country has issues with water and sanitation and 11% no water at all, plastering walls with stucco that will prevent the spreading of Chagas disease, solid cement grounds in rural areas where 24% of rural population has dirt floors. In Honduras 76% of the families who live in the country side still cook with firewood and by providing smokeless eco-stoves we prevent respiratory diseases and reducing the use of fuel, land tenure to develop small dwellings, also providing 200 housing solutions to very far places like the Mosquito Coast. We believe that safe and affordable housing is a crucial foundation for breaking the cycle of poverty.

Antonia is a young woman of just 26 years old from Gracias Lempira, Honduras, and like most of the Young people of the country, she thought that the possibility of having her own place it was just a dream.

All this changed as soon she knew about the housing projects of Habitat for Humanity Honduras "a friend told me she's built her house with Habitat and that call my attention, I asked for the requirements and

I noticed I was able to apply, some of them were having an income and taking care of my family, in my case my Mom depends economically from me.

I'm pleased, this is an inexplicable feeling, having my own house at a very early age, knowing that the country has limited opportunities for young people that do not qualify for housing loans".

Also she added "if someone told me that at my age I will own a house I couldn't believe it.

"Habitat make dreams come true, it was difficult tell my Mom that we have to move again and again every time the contract was expired"








At the River: Struggle and Grace in the Segregated South Sun., April 3, 5 p.m.
