

The Passage of Time



history writers in Mt Pleasant. "A Stately Heritage, The Story of Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian Church 1699-2001" by John L All tells the story of the life of MPPC. Reading the history, I couldn't help but again being impressed

with the dedication and generosity of many people through the years! The post-World War II-history of MPPC was a busy time, beginning in 1948 with the report, "a strong full-time leader at last!" Then follows stories of ever-growing ministries, adding land and buildings, rebuilding, finances, meals, activities, reorganization and rebuilding...

And the stories of our pastors... It is interesting that of the 8 "full-time pastors" since 1948, only 4 stayed longer than 10 years. And from the last 4 "full-time pastors" at MPPC, only 1 managed to stay longer than 5 years. There were also many associate pastors, interim pastors, a parish associate or two, directors of Christian education and music, and of course, support staff (which I guess some must have been full-time, as I read that Peter Jorgenson served as the first full-time Associate Pastor from May 1980-December 1985) and an intern or two.

Somehow, I get the impression that MPPC hasn't done a great job in retaining pastors. Is the problem with the congregation, or with the pastors? Through a simple process of deduction (the only factor that stays the same!) is MPPC. Systems theory poses that a system gives the results for which it has been designed and set up. And if the problem is with the congregation, what is it, and how can we try to prevent our history from continuing in this way?

I am convinced that MPPC takes care of every staff member who works here. The congregation is generous in making sure that everyone can live, even in these financial circumstances we find ourselves in. I think some of the problems lie with our expectations of our "full-time pastor."

Do we expect to have a preaching pastor, to recreate the previous time of stellar growth? (It will not happen!) Do we expect someone who will lead us to great and successful ministries, being a glamorous country club church for only those who can afford the membership fees?

I wonder how many of our current members became members during the ministry of Rev. Jim Lowry. According to John All, Jim wrote, "...my fondest memories of Mt Pleasant are of people... and My closest relationships were with the staff..." It was during his ministry (July 1981—April 1992) that the congregation grew with almost 30 members a year (a total of 310 members), while Mt. Pleasant's population grew from 15,000-21,876.

Would it change anything if everyone in the congregation prayed that God will prepare us. and prepare the right candidate to be our future pastor, while we try to understand what we truly expect of such a candidate? And what reasonable expectations we have of the pastor who leads Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian for the next 10-15 years?

What if a healthy transition takes some time much longer than the replacement of personnel takes in the secular world—because we try to find out who God has called us to be, what the ministries are God calls us to, and who our neighbor is?

What if we begin to believe that we all are indeed participating in God's choice for our next longterm, full-time pastor here at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, and open ourselves to the work of God's Spirit who continues to guide, nudge, empower, inspire, comfort, and inform us in a journey to grow together as God's representative in this part of Mt. Pleasant?

When You Hear God Calling...

Have you ever prayed for God to let you hear His voice and show you how He wants you to be His hands, His feet, His eyes, and His heart to do His work? Bruce McAdams heard that Call and acted on it. Upon receiving a call from Lutheran Services, Bruce made a trip to the MUSC Dental School to provide transportation for an Afghan refugee. There he met Nadia Paikan, a 28 year-old mother of 4. Bruce took Nadia and her two sons to a podiatrist for an in-grown toe nail.

Rewind to Sept. 21, 2021:

The world watched in horror, the terror in Afghanistan as the Taliban seized power, cutting off avenues of escape for the Afghan people. Nadia fled to the airport with a 2 week-old daughter, a 19 month-old daughter and her two sons, then ages 6 and 9. Her husband, who worked at a radio station, was prevented from leaving because he had been grabbed by the Taliban. She and the children had already left to go to the airport. They had discussed that if this should happen, that she would take the kids and leave. They are able to keep in touch though she still worries. She also left behind her mother, father, and four siblings.

Nadia has an attorney who speaks Dari who is helping her to be granted asylum here so that she can apply for a green card. Lutheran Services of the Carolinas is paying the attorney fees. Nadia lives in a two-bedroom apartment in N. Charleston and she works 4 days a week at the Istanbul Shish Kabob Restaurant. Before we started providing transportation to and from work, she would take her two young daughters to daycare by bus and then ride the bus to work. At the end of the work day, she would ride the bus to daycare and then back to her apartment with the girls. Her boys go home after school to an empty apartment and wait for Nadia and the sisters to come home.

MPPC members from the Local Impact mission team and The Academy of St. John church school class have also heard God calling and are providing transportation for Nadia. Other church members from MPPC and other congregations in the area have been providing furniture, diapers and other household items. Soon, Bruce plans to organize providing regular transportation to and from the grocery, in-home learning English sessions and driver's training. Sudais, the eldest, is almost fluent having been learning English since living in the United States.

Nadia has expressed many times to Zainab, her caseworker, how grateful she is for the ways we have been able to make positive changes in the lives of herself and her children.

MPPC is working with members of Providence Church and All Saints Lutheran; together we form a Circle of Welcome. Bruce keeps us all posted as to donations received and what is needed. While Lutheran Services drives home that the refugees need to become independent and self-sufficient, Nadia needs more support, care and help than other Afghan refugees who have come to Charleston, such as single men and families with both parents present, in order to become self-sufficient.

So, this is how God awakens his people to hear His call and follow. Love your neighbor, Jesus told his disciples.

Terms to Know This Fall

- Sunday School We bring back a term most familiar to everyone, Sunday School. Sunday School is our education time that meets on Sunday mornings.

THE HARBOR (9:30-10:30)

The Harbor is an in-depth Bible study that includes presentation and discussion. This fall the class begins in Paul's letter to the Romans. No preparation is necessary; the Bible is your study quide and text! Butch Hills facilitates and participants gain rich insight through a historical perspective of the text. GH 222.

<u>ACADEMY OF ST. JOHN</u> (9:30-10:30)

This lecture-style class approaches Scripture through the lens of academics whenever possible while using DVD resources to deepen the class presentation. Studies this fall include Adam Hamilton's Creed: What Christians Believe and Why (the Apostles' Creed) in Sept/Oct. The Wired Word is our curriculum in early Nov. and will explore weekly current events through the lens of Scripture. Amy-Jill Levine's Light of the World: A Beginners Guide to Advent will round out the 2022 studies Advent Nov. 27- Dec. 18. SB 206.

CONNECT 3 (9:30-10:30)

This diverse and growing class studies Scripture through thematic and topical studies. Their curriculum line-up for the year includes Called: Hearing and Responding to God's Voice, by Susan Robb, our 2022 Lenten study author (Sept/ Oct), Words of Life: Jesus and the Promise of the Ten Commandments Today, by Adam Hamilton (Oct/Nov), another Adam Hamilton study Faithful: Christmas Through the Eyes of Joseph (Nov. 27) – Dec. 18), 1 Corinthians: Searching the Depths of God, by Jaime Clark-Soles (January/February 2023), Courage: Jesus and the Call to Brave Faith, by Tom Berlin (Feb/Mar), and Christianity and World Religions: Questions We Ask about Other Faiths, by Adam Hamilton (Apr/May). This class has shared leadership among class members and is discussion-based. Participants in this class will also engage in mission and service opportunities locally and internationally, with scattered fellowship parties throughout the year! Parlor.

Sunday School: Sunday Mornings pt. 2

"YOUNGISH" ADULTS (10-10:50)

While children and youth are connecting on Sunday mornings in their space, we hope parents and young adults will come together during the education hour for fellowship, conversation, and study in their newly renovated space – the library! This year our youngish adult curriculum includes Doug Fields' *Intentional Parenting: 10 Ways to Be an Exceptional Parent in a Quick-Fix World* (Sept/Oct), Adam Hamilton's *Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity* (Oct/Nov), an Advent study yet to be named Nov. 27 – Dec. 18, *Love to Stay: Six Keys to a Successful Marriage*, by Adam Hamilton (Jan/Feb 2023), followed by the church-wide Lenten study. THE MIDDLE (10-10:50)

We are all in the middle of something. Some of us are in the middle of raising kids, our lives, taking care of parents etc. All of us are somewhere in the middle of our faith journey. This group explores and studies God's message for them in these seasons of life. Initial studies in The Middle class this year include Called: Hearing and Responding to God's Voice, by Susan Robb, our Lenten author from 2022 (Sept/Oct), The Difficult Words of Jesus, by Amy-Jill Levine (Oct/Nov/early Jan), and an Advent study yet to be selected. SB 210.

Beyond Sundays

MEN AND WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY, Sunday (4 p.m.)

Class selects material on a study-by-study basis. This group also typically participates in church-wide small group studies. Meets on the <u>MPPC campus</u>.

MEN'S MORNING STUDY, Friday (7 a.m.)

This is an informal group of men, ranging in age from 20's to 70's dedicated to learning more about the Bible as they study the Bible one book at a time, reading and discussing about one chapter per week. There is NO HOMEWORK, and the Bible is the curriculum. The group gathers for breakfast and fellowship at <u>Page's Okra Grill</u> on the first Friday of the month.

SOUL TRAINING, Monday (6:45 p.m)

This weekly Bible Study is open to men and women of all ages and is looking at the Gospel of Luke. <u>GH 123</u>.

THE IN-BETWEEN

If you are a young person and looking for a small group for (mostly) post-college young people, consider joining The In-Between. The group is an informal Bible study that gathers around Mount Pleasant for study and fellowship. Contact Dan Wiard for more information.

The Old Testament books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon (also call the Song of Songs) were once attributed to King Solomon.
