# What Will 2023 Bring?



I do not know how ready you are for (another!) new year. Whether we are ready or not, 2023 is upon us!

And who knows what this new year will bring? How will we find our way through this year? What

lies in store for us—personally, as a community, for our country, and for Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church? We don't know. But we know we are not alone on this journey into a new year! We believe that Emmanuel is with us, and will lead us...

# **Leten Small Groups**

Lenten small groups have been an annual event at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church for some time and this year is no exception! This year our intergenerational Lenten kickoff is **Sunday, February 19, 2023**, in the Fellowship Hall with dinner at 5 p.m., followed by a program that will help us get ready for Lent.

For our study this year we will be using Adam Hamilton's study *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts and Outlaws*.

Jesus came to lift up the lowly. Throughout his ministry to his final days on the road to the cross, we find stories of his relationships with ordinary, flawed, and unexpected people. He met, dined, and traveled with people who were not perfect. Many of them were struggling, some were outsiders or even outlaws. Whoever they were, from those he healed to the outlaws with him at his crucifixion, Jesus brought the good news of God's kingdom to those who most needed to hear it.

In Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws, pastor and bestselling author Adam Hamilton explores the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus as told in the Gospel of Luke. Through Luke's stories we find Jesus' care and compassion for all as he welcomes sinners and outcasts. As we study Luke and see Jesus' concern for those who were considered unimportant, we hear a hopeful and inspiring word for our lives today.

Small groups typically meet one hour for six consecutive weeks during the season of Lent, February 19 – April 2 and have met virtually and in-person. Curriculum is provided and sign-ups for a small group will begin in January. Groups are open to newcomers and meet throughout the week from early morning hours (men's group) to Sunday evenings, weekdays, and weeknights and meet in people's homes or on the MPPC campus. Though we don't like to think about it, a change in health or an accident can happen to any of us. That's why it's important for all of us - regardless of our age or health - to talk with our families and loved ones about what kind of care we would want if we ever become too sick to speak for ourselves. No one wants to be in the difficult position of having to guess what kind of treatment a loved one would want or not want, and everyone wants to feel like they honored their loved one's choices.

"Five Wishes" is a document that helps you and the people in your life talk together about decisions, medical treatment, comfort, how you want to be treated, and what you want loved ones to know. The Older Adult Ministry Team hopes you will join us. Sign up through Realm or by calling the church office.

### **Sunday School**

There are classes for all ages on Sunday mornings and childcare during both Services of Worship and Sunday School. # Construction in Haiti brings hope during holidays

Following last year's earthquake in the southern part of Haiti, the MPPC international missions team joined other churches to help in the rebuilding process through our mission partner in Haiti, Haiti Outreach Ministries HOM). Here is a report on their progress:

Thanks to generous donations received for earthquake relief, HOM is building six homes in the town of Cavaillon. Cavaillon is 45 miles from the epicenter, and the community there suffered significant damage. Earlier this year, Pastor Leon made several trips to Cavaillon to meet with community leaders and affected families to determine how HOM could provide support.

In addition to the houses, HOM is also constructing 4 wells in the area to

give people access to clean, safe drinking water. Additionally, we are partnering with FIDA-pch, a Canadian-based organization that has worked in rural Haiti for nearly 40 years, to provide mobile medical clinics so that families in the area will have access to needed health care. These photos show the swift progress being made on these houses. HOM is grateful to the generous donors who are making this effort possible and are literally putting a roof over these families' heads.

# **HOM Frequently Asked Questions:**

# What is happening in the HOM supported schools?

The 3 primary schools and 1 secondary school remain unable to open due to on-going insecurity in Port-au-Prince. The main concern is the ability of students to safely get to and from school each day as gang violence remains prevalent.







Until students can safely return to the classroom, our administrators and teachers have been preparing lessons and coursework that can be done at home. The lessons are picked up on a bi-weekly basis by parents, and teachers also provide instructions to the families so they can support their students in completing the lessons. Emergency food is also sent home with the lessons. The vocational school has been able to reopen as of November and is currently serving 168 adult students. The vocational school can operate because the students are adults & young people who mostly live near the campus and are able to come by themselves (as opposed to the younger students who need to be brought by their parents).

# What is happening at the HOM supported medical clinic?

The clinic has resumed its normal operations and is open daily from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm. The staff has been especially focused on addressing the cholera outbreak, providing education and information on treating water so it is safe to drink, as well as dealing with cases of malnutrition due to rising hunger. On 12/19, the Haitian Ministry of Health is launching a vaccination campaign against cholera, and our clinic will serve as an immunization site. The clinic staff reports they are seeing more patients with high blood pressure and diabetes issues due to the stressful environment. The clinic has also sadly seen firsthand the effects of gang violence through young rape victims who have come to the clinic for care.

# Are the financial systems working? How does HOM know money sent to Haiti is getting there?

Despite everything, banking systems are working. HOM wires funds to partner MICECC monthly. We receive confirmation when the funds are received, and we also receive detailed financial reports from MICECC tracking all income and expenses.

### <u>Does HOM still need student sponsorship funds</u> <u>while the schools are closed?</u>

Yes, we ask that sponsors continue this vital support. These funds allow HOM to continue to pay the teachers their monthly salaries as they prepare take-home lessons for students and also ensure classes are ready when school does reopen. Funds also are being used to distribute food to students and their families to alleviate hunger until the school lunch meal resumes.


# The Giving Book Gallery
