Membership of MPPC



Do you consider yourself to be a baptized member, an active member. or affiliate member of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church? These are the only categories of membership in the Presbyterian Church

(USA) (Book of Order G-1.04), which means that we do not have any inactive members. We do take into consideration that we have people who are shut-in (or homebound), but who remain active members.

An "active member" is a person who has made a profession of faith in Christ, has been baptized, has been received into membership of the church, has voluntarily submitted to the government of this church, and participates in the church's work and worship.

So, do you consider yourself to be an active member of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church? How do you participate in the congregation's work and worship? When last did you attend worship in person?

When last did you access your profile on Realm (*onrealm.org/mppc*) to make sure your information is up to date? If you do not have a sign-in, email our Administrative Assistant, Alanna Barrett, in the office and ask for one. Do we have a recent picture of you? (COVID and the years changed all of us)!

You will soon receive a call from someone from MPPC asking if you want to be an active member of MPPC (more about active members next time). I know you understand that we must purge our rolls which currently contain more than 3,500 names, only 1,516 of whom who seemed to be active recently. We only have about 700 people attending worship, 311 pledging "units," and far less involved in all the ministries of MPPC.

Thank you for helping us determine how many people are left as "active members" of MPPC.

I have the results of most of the groups in hand, and am currently waiting for one or two groups to finish their discernment and discussions.



ADULT FAITH FORMATION CLASSES IN MARCH

In addition to Lenten Small Groups, there are Sunday School classes that are rich for our faith development. These classes are always open to visitors and new people each week.

Connect 3 (9:30 a.m., Parlor) Courage: Jesus and the Call to Brave Faith, by Tom Berlin.

As Christians, we do our best to live our lives as Jesus lived, following the examples of his many virtues—including honesty, faithfulness, and generosity. But one virtue that is often overlooked is courage. Throughout Jesus' life, he was called upon to be brave: in the face of his enemies, when being tempted, and certainly at the time of his death. By examining the life of Christ, we can begin to understand what true courage is and how God works in our lives when we exhibit a brave faith. In Courage: Jesus and the Call to Brave Faith, pastor and author Tom Berlin challenges us to unlock the courage that we already possess as Christ followers, and in doing so, we can begin to find the remarkable life Jesus offers us.

The Academy of Saint John (9:30 a.m., SB 206) Finding Jesus in the Psalms: A Lenten Journey, by Barb Roose.

Barb Roose guides the reader through a meaningful encounter with the Psalms through the season of Lent. Combining an interpretation of the psalms with real life stories, the study moves through the familiar words of Psalm 23 toward the painful cries of Psalm 22 uttered by Jesus on the cross. The study includes reflections on the life of King David and the original context of the writings, along with connections between the psalms and the life and death of Jesus the Messiah.

"The Psalms provide a perfect framework for experiencing Lent through the verses that were Jesus's own scriptures, offering both him and us strength and wisdom in a painful and redemptive season. The Book of Psalms hums with the heartbeat of our humanity with divinely inspired words that find purchase in the tenderest places in our hearts when our human words or wisdom fails us." - Barb Roose

The Harbor (9:30 a.m., GH 222), Romans

This class uses the Bible as its text and travels throughout Scripture based on the season and the conversations of the group. They currently are studying Paul's letter to the Romans. If you are looking for rich history lessons on the Bible, consider The Harbor.

The Middle & The Youngish Adults (10 a.m., GH 226 and SB 209 respectively) Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws, by Adam Hamilton

Jesus came to lift the lowly. Throughout his ministry to his final days on the road to the cross, we find stories of his relationships with ordinary, flawed, and unexpected people. He met, dined, and traveled with people who were not perfect. Many of them were struggling, some were outsiders or even outlaws. Whoever they were, from those he healed to the outlaws with him at his crucifixion, Jesus brought the good news of God's kingdom to those who most needed to hear it.

In Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws, pastor and bestselling author Adam Hamilton explores the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus as told in the Gospel of Luke. Through Luke's stories we find Jesus' care and compassion for all as he welcomes sinners and outcasts. As we study Luke and see Jesus' concern for those who were considered unimportant, we hear a hopeful and inspiring word for our lives today.



During Lent

We will be deep into our Lenten study by the time March ends. I wonder how, or if, our image of Jesus will change. I believe those closest to Jesus never fully understood who Jesus was



until after the resurrection. We have an advantage to the disciple's perspective, but I wonder if we truly see Jesus. I know the more I dive into Scripture, the richer is my understanding of who Jesus was, what Jesus did for me, and what I am called to be as his disciple.

In Adam Hamilton's book Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws, Jesus ministers to the lowly, people who are not always accepted in life. Hamilton's chapters focus on people who are poor and marginalized., women (it was a patriarchal world during Jesus' time on earth), and his parables speak of tax collectors, children who leave home after demanding their share of the inheritance, and a man named Lazarus. On Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Luke writes of Jesus being with lepers, Samaritans, and children. And then in his final week. Jesus is with a tax collector and heals a blind beggar, drives merchants and moneychangers from the temple, and highlights a widow's mite. Then finally, on the cross, Jesus is crucified alongside two criminals. We can understand why Hamilton titles his book as he does.

During Lent we are invited and encouraged to read the Gospel of Luke in its entirety. As we read and dialogue and hear Luke's story through Hamilton's book, how is your life being shaped and informed by Scripture? In the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "Who is Jesus Christ for us today?"



Annual Rakes on Wheels Mission Activity Kicks Off in March

The Rakes on Wheels annual yard cleanup serves a special elderly and disabled community in Mount Pleasant. Meals on Wheels provides food at no cost to 350 homebound clients in our community. The organization also serves its clients by meeting their "non-food" needs through Rakes on Wheels so that they might remain in their homes as long as possible.

For about 4% of these clients, they do not have either the financial or people resources (nearby family or friends) to do basic tasks like cleaning up their yards after the winter passes. Homebound individuals are often isolated and/ or unable to do the things they formerly did themselves which is why this mission is so important. When MPPC



volunteers come to their homes and clean up their yards, something magical happens...this connection with MPPC volunteers for just 2 hours means a great deal to these individuals. They are able to express their deep appreciation and often their emotions overwhelm them to see the caring and love expressed through the work of a family or team helping them.

What a wonderful learning experience for the family and children that see this reaction when one neighbor helps another. Please bring your family or team to help one of these special homebound elders/disabled persons this year. Rakes, bags, and guidance for what is expected will all be provided to volunteers. Get the ball rolling by contacting Jim Ingham (inghamsc@ hotmail.com) or Alexis, our receptionist (843 884-8621) at church to volunteer. MPPC's Local Missions Team will be conducting this annual activity March 1st through 31. We need 50 adults/ youth. We expect to do about 12 yards with around 4 volunteers per yard. You pick your date/time to work to do just 2 hours of raking and moving yard bags to the street.

Nadia's Story Part Two

Nadia and her four children (Sudais, Taib, Mobara and Asra) continue to get settled in Charleston while waiting to hear if they will gain asylum status and are evaluating every avenue to get her husband, Fraidoon, out of Afghanistan. In January, Bruce McAdams and Coleman Legerton took Nadia and the children to Atlanta for their interview at the US Citizenship and Immigration Services. NNadia and her immigration attorney felt the meeting went well and we are all eager to hear whether asylum status has been granted.

Dedicated volunteers from MPPC and Providence Church on Daniel Island continue to provide necessary transportation to work, daycare, medical appointments, etc. as well as offer English lessons to Nadia and Taib, her second grader who is struggling with reading. Both congregations have also been very generous with their donations to the Refugee fund which is helping Nadia pay her monthly expenses.

Nadia's road to self-sufficiency is a long one and thankfully we also have Lutheran Services of the Carolinas as our partner. Nadia's caseworker is incredibly dedicated to helping her in all aspects of resettlement. Bruce McAdams and Maryanne Davis have been meeting with Nadia and her team at Lutheran Services to identify her most pressing concerns as well as goals and steps to move forward. Right now Self Help/Mental Health, Housing and Financial Stability are her three main focus areas. We understand each of these are huge and will take many years to accomplish but also are helping Nadia see the thousands of baby steps that are necessary to help her down the path to self-sufficiency.

We continue to be amazed at Nadia's strength and courage to leave her husband, her support system and everyone/everything she knew and get on a plane with four children, the youngest was only 15 days old! She is an incredible example of self-sacrifice to provide a better life for your children.



We who are walking along side Nadia and her children as they cope with building a life here away from her husband and the rest of her family, feel a great joy in helping and providing support as we are able. Nadia constantly says how grateful she is for everything we are doing to help.

Transportation for her and the children to work and daycare and medical appointments is a great need. Hope House is no exception. Except here it is by necessity, not choice.

Over the past years, this old house has weathered many storms and taken quite a beating. The bridge to Hope House, which is often the first thing our guests see, needs to be replaced. Then there's the wood rot outside the House as well as Hope Cottage which remains a top priority.

Due to heavy rains and flooding issues, we have to replace all the siding on the Cottage, add gutters, install an air/water tight exterior door, repair or replace warped baseboards and crown molding.. then prime and paint it all.

The Ministry Team is working to secure the funds for these renovations. This way we can continue providing a safe and secure, temporary home-awayfrom-home for adults who are tending to loved ones in area hospitals miles from their own homes.




