Pastor Nominating Committee



We are finally at the place where the Session determined that MPPC is ready to elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to begin the search for the next senior pastor for our congregation.

The PNC is elected by the congregation from among their own members. The Congregational Nominating Committee (CNC) is in a process of nominating this group of people, who will serve the congregation by being on the PNC. The CNC looks for people who are involved in congregational life, who are dedicated to and invested in the future of MPPC, and who ideally understand where we are in the life cycle of the church. An understanding of our history, cultural context, demographics, finances, mission, and vision for the future is also important when we choose a new leader. And maybe this shouldn't be said, but here it is—they should be without any agenda of their own or of a specific grouping of the congregation!

Searching for a pastor is a process of spiritual discernment, where a group of people work with God to find the next spiritual leader for this congregation in a specific location, in this time of our history. The PNC becomes the body who affirms someone's call to ministry in a specific geographic location.

Choosing between candidates who believe that God has called them to ministry in a specific congregation takes patience, a solid process, and above all, spiritual discernment.

When we choose a new leader, we must keep in mind that the only head of the Church is Jesus, the Christ, and no pastor can ever be expected to fill this position.

Please keep everyone who will be nominated in your prayers.

Adult Faith Formation Opportunities through May 21

As summer quickly approaches and family schedules become inundated with family events and trips, adult Sunday School remains a main stay in adult faith formation. Regular Sunday School continues through May 21 with the following options:

Christianity and World Religions. (Connect 3, 9:30 a.m.)

Popular author and pastor Adam Hamilton leads participants in exploring four major world religions—Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, and Judaism—and compares the beliefs of each with those of Christianity. He deals openly and honestly with questions people ask about other religions, such as:

- Why are there so many different religions?
- How should Christians view other religions?
- How is God at work in other religions?
- What is the fate of those who earnestly pursue God through other religions?
- In examining these major world religions and the beliefs of their followers, Hamilton urges us as Christians to build bridges with others so that we might grow in our faith, seek peace in our world, love our neighbors, and find positive ways to share the gospel.

Love to Stay: Six Keys to a Successful Marriage. (Youngish Adults, 10 a.m.)

The idea of a lasting marriage has almost vanished. But in *Love to Stay*, Adam Hamilton explores how, with God's help, it doesn't have to be that way. Drawing upon a survey of thousands of couples and singles, interviews with relationship and marriage therapists, the latest research in the field, and wisdom from the Bible, Hamilton looks at what it takes to create and sustain healthy, meaningful romantic relationships across the course of a lifetime. Contents include:

- More Than a Piece of Paper
- · What She Wants; What He Wants
- The Significance of Sexual Intimacy
- Habits That Hurt, Habits That Heal
- Clothe, Bear With, and Forgive
- A Love That Lasts a Lifetime

Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws. (The Middle, 10 a.m.)

In our Lenten study *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws,* pastor and bestselling author Adam Hamilton explored the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus as told in the Gospel of Luke. Through Luke's stories we found Jesus' care and compassion for all as he welcomed sinners and outcasts. As we studied Luke and saw Jesus' concern for those who were considered unimportant, we heard a hopeful and inspiring word for our lives today. Through the end of May, The Middle dives deeper into the themes of our Lenten study and the Gospel of Luke.

Signs and Wonders: A Beginners Guide to the Miracles of Jesus. (Academy of Saint John, 9:30 a.m.)

In Signs and Wonders: A Beginner's Guide to the Miracles of Jesus, Amy-Jill Levine explores selected miracles of Jesus in historical and theological context. For each miracle, she discusses not only how past witnesses would have understood the events, but also how today's readers can draw meaning from Jesus' words and actions.

Chapter topics include:

- Giving sight to the blind: Metaphors of understanding (Mark 8, John 9)
- "Take up your pallet and walk" (the paralyzed man): On the role of caregivers
- A bleeding woman and a dead girl: The importance of women's bodies
- Walking on water and stilling the storm: Ecological readings of the Gospels
- The feeding of the 5,000 (or more): The centrality of bread
- The raising of Lazarus: Taking death seriously

The Book of Romans. (The Harbor, 9:30 a.m.)

Through open discussion this class is working its way through Romans, looking at each verse and the stories that surround Paul's writing to the church in Rome.



Summer Adult Sunday School Study 1 & 2 Peter and Jude (10 a.m.)

"I'll never grow up." Sometimes we all feel a little like Peter Pan. We'd rather be children, free of obligations and responsibilities. Sometimes we even feel that way about our Christian lives. The writers of 1 and 2 Peter and Jude understand how difficult it is to grow into maturity. As Carolyn Nystrom leads us through these letters in this Bible Study, we see how God provides direction and comfort when we travel dark roads. And we discover what it takes to be mature in Christ. 

received no later than June 5. Registrations are non-refundable once registered with Montreat.



Please join in the procession of bagpipes, Beadle, Crucifer, and Tartan Flags as we celebrate The Kirkin' O' the Tartan service on May 21st at 9 and 11 a.m. (Procession will take place during the 11 a.m. service).

After the Battle of Culloden, 1746, the British forbade traditional Scottish heritage for nearly 50 years. A Successful Spring with Rakes on Wheels

The Spring Yard Cleanup for Meals on Wheels recipients also known as Rakes on Wheels, was a success by many measures this year. Some 14 homebound Meals on Wheels recipients received assistance from 71 adults and children from our church during the month of March.

In total, 350 yard bags were filled with leaves and then moved to the street for pickup. The average number of yard bags filled from each yard was 25. A more subjective measure in this effort was the "fun" level. Children loved their smaller rakes and actively pitched in. The kids were distracted from their work in one yard when a neighbor's cat appeared and decided it needed petting and attention. The work on all yards was begun and completed within two hours. Even the weather cooperated by postponing rain until scheduled work was finished. Thanks go to all the young families who participated in large numbers this year. Kudos also go to John Royall, of Royall Ace Hardware, who contributed rakes to this year's effort to ensure everyone had a rake in their hand at the right time!

We had beautiful yards to clean up during Rakes on Wheels as well as more modest ones. The common denominator was the deep appreciation of all the homeowners.







Stephen Minister Commissioning on May 21st

Seven members of MPPC have come to a training class for the internationally known program, Stephen Ministry, every Thursday evening since January to learn about everything from listening skills, to confidentiality, to learning how to deal with grief, depression and suicide.

On May 21st at the 11 a.m. worship service, these four women and three men will join the already eight active Stephen Ministers in the congregation to become one-on-one listeners, prayer partners and care partners to people in need, as they are commissioned to be MPPC's newest Stephen Ministers. 1. Buddy DeLizza - Originally from Charlotte NC, Buddy was raised in Asheville, NC before spending 25 years in the Concord, NC area where he was a member of First Presbyterian Church. He served as Deacon, Elder, Sunday School Teacher and volunteered with Habitat for Humanity, Boy Scouts, Opportunity House, and VBS. He moved to Mt. Pleasant in 2022.

2. Susan Fitzgerald - Susan joined MPPC in 2016. She is a part of the Member Care Ministry Team, the PW Circle of Sisters, a resting deacon, a Deacon Hospitality Co-Chair for Receptions for Staff, an usher, a Sunday Breakfast Volunteer and part of Pacesetters.

God's Healing Power

Every Hope House guest has a story to tell. Some are heartbreaking; others are uplifting; and still others are inspiring.

This is the story of two recent guests - sisters from New Jersey and a brother, a drifter, they had not seen in 20 years.

On March 1st Velma and Terisitia were notified that their brother, known as "Shorty", was in a hospital in Columbia, SC. He was on life support and doctors said they needed to come there and "make a decision."

They and some cousins were there the next day, meeting with the team caring for their brother. They were told there was "no life left in him." Velma said they could not make a decision – "they needed more time."

She bent down and told her brother the family has forgiven him.. and so has the Lord. They all prayed and sang over him.

Each day doctors would ask if they had made a decision, saying their brother was "clinically dead." Velma would not give up.. urging "Shorty" to come back to them.

On March 4th, Shorty opened his eyes. Velma told him "show me some movement." And he moved his arms. Five days later, he was off life support. Velma says miraculous things happen when you believe in God's healing power.

Shorty is now at Vibra for rehabilitation. And he can talk. In fact Velma says he "has a lot to say."


Clothing Drive for Nadia
