ON SUNDAY, DECEMBER 31, WE WILL ONLY HAVE ONE SERVICE AT 10 AM. THERE WILL BE NO SUNDAY SCHOOL.

One of the things that deeply puzzles me, is the real involvement of church members in the ministries of MPPC. We have great excitement on Sundays at worship, and we truly experience that God is present as God's Spirit roams among us. Our congregational activities have a

fair participation. We have Sunday school classes, attended by all age groups. We have Tuesday and Thursday morning prayer breakfast at 7 a.m., with many young people getting earlier out of bed to attend a social prayer meeting with their peers. We have a spread of all ages involved in serving and enjoying Sunday mornings' breakfast, and involved in children and youth activities. We witness to all generations that there is meaning in being a new family of God!

Yet, everything we do costs money. It is the world we live in. How much do you know about how and where the money you give to further God's work, is used for that purpose?

We recently had our yearly stewardship campaign, to which people contributed considerable sums of money.

Financially, we have strong and above-anysuspicion controls in place to ensure that all the money given to MPPC through the planned giving of members is safe and accounted for.

My puzzlement stems from our attitude to what happens after we have handed "off" our estimates of planned giving.

Maybe, because I always had to budget in some or other way to do things, I don't understand how we behave when it comes to the church budget! After our consecration Sunday, we begin to demand to spend... sometimes not keeping an eye on our income (I know, I have been accused of living with a narrative of scarcity, but you cannot spend more than you have, even if God promised to take care of all our needs!)

Does our planned giving for 2024 keep us connected to the ministries of MPPC, or do we give and forget—some months regretting it somewhat because we could have used it better? Are we intentionally taking note of when money "goes out of our account," knowing that we respond to God's generosity to us?

Do we stay aware of income and spending in the church budget? Do we know how and on what our pooled resources are spent?

I have attended a business shareholder meeting once. I was amazed at what kind of questions were asked; how the shareholders insisted on knowing what happens to their investment. Have you ever asked a question at a congregational meeting, or dropped in at our Director of Finance to get some insight?

Do you see yourself as a partner in the ministries of our congregation, or is it now up to "them" to do what we have paid for?

May this Season of generosity, of celebrating Advent and Christmas, give us time to reflect on God's generosity in Christ to each of us, and encourage us to be more involved in the activities of MPPC, and in the use of the money that we give to enable people to tell the story of our generous God.

Village Concert Series on Friday, Dec. 8 at 7 pm


Please join us on Friday, Dec. 8 at 7 pm in the MPPC Fellowship Hall to enjoy this performance by the Charleston Flute Choir.

A Church-Wide Advent Study: Experiencing Christmas

We are beginning the season of Advent. The sights and sounds and aromas abound in stores. So much around us says that Christmas is coming. Get ready! It will be here.

Our Advent study, *Experiencing Christmas: Christ in the Sights and Sounds of Advent*, walks us through the many senses (sight, sound, taste, touch) we experience during the season while also exploring how we see these senses in the Christmas narrative. Author Matt Rawle explains, "Christmas is the celebration that God now has senses. God put on flesh in the person of Jesus to experience and redeem humanity in a unique and radical way. Instead of burning offerings so our prayers may rise to the heavens, God has come down to us..."

What does it mean for God to have senses, and what does it have to do with us? When a woman bathed Jesus's feet with her tears, he asked the host, "Do you see this woman?" (Luke 7:44). Simon the Pharisee could only see her sin. How often do our eyes fall short of this divine compassion? The Christmas story reminds us that God sees both what we see and what we fail to see.

And while we know that Jesus's time did not have the music we have today, do you wonder what Jesus heard? Did Jesus find certain sounds annoying? Maybe cries for healing, the sound of desperation and lament, were as unpalatable to Jesus's ears as nails scraped across a chalkboard. Maybe those sounds called attention to injustice or a need for Jesus to act, to teach, to restore, to heal.

Our sense of taste is unique, individual, subjective, and powerful. Taste can offer a sense of wonder or the comfort of home. Taste is a gift. Food doesn't have to taste good, but it does, and therefore taste reminds us of grace. God doesn't have to forgive. God doesn't have to be merciful. God didn't have to empty the divine and walk with us, use our language, or eat our food, but God did. The simple joy of tasting something delicious causes us involuntarily to stop, breathe, and be thankful. That sounds like the gospel to me. The psalmist's advice to "taste and see how good the Lord is" isn't about salty, sweet, or savory, but it is about what satisfies.

Finally, there is touch. A touch of joy. Joy is the steadfast assurance that God is with us. The

distance between us and the divine becomes indistinguishable. Jesus is fully human and fully divine, without division, embodied with a sense of touch that will know what it means to be held, to be cared for, and to know pain and sorrow. Touch is not only about what our hands can hold or how we are held, but all that accompanies our emotions. In Jesus, God knows happiness and loss, excitement, and curiosity...

We invite you to join us this Advent season on two Wednesday evenings, **December 6 and 13, as we gather for dinner and fellowship at 5:30 p.m., followed by study at 6:15 p.m.** using Matt Rawle's *Experiencing Christmas: Christ in the Sights and Sounds of Advent.* Register on at <u>mppc.net/events</u> for the Wednesday evening study.

Advent Devotion Booklets (Copies available beginning November 29.)

This year the Adult Faith Formation Ministry Team is providing both digital and a limited number of printed Advent Devotion Booklets for members of MPPC. This year's Devotions comes from the Presbyterian Outlook and is called Apocalyptic Advent: Embracing Hope in the Second Coming of Christ.

This devotional will highlight and reflect upon apocalyptic passages of the Hebrew Bible, as well as passages in the New Testament that refer to the second coming of Christ. Some Christians use these texts as weapons, stoking fear of end-time judgment to convert people. This devotional highlights the ways people from marginalized communities turn to end-time prophecies for hope. These voices, along with biblical scholars who offer helpful historical and cultural context, will be this devotion's focus.

Printed copies of the booklet will be available at the church beginning on Wednesday, November 29, at the Advent Workshop. What Are They Studying?

Are you looking for an adult Sunday School class and want to know what they are studying? Here's the schedule for December. Note that Sunday School class Advent studies are beginning November 26.

<u>Academy of St. John</u> – On November 26, the class begins their Advent studying using Adam Hamilton's The Journey: Walking the Road to Bethlehem. Journey with Adam Hamilton as he travels from Nazareth to Bethlehem in this fascinating look at the birth of Jesus Christ. Using historical information and archeological data, the birth will become even more real through these sessions. (SB 206)

Youngish Adults - The class will use Experiencing Christmas: Christ in the Sights and Sounds of Advent for their 4-week Advent study. (SB 209)

Connect 3 - On November 26, the class will begin their Advent study using Will Willimon's Heaven & Earth: Advent and the Incarnation as Willimon introduces participants to the God who brings heaven to earth and changes everything. In the Advent season, heaven seems so close as we remember that a tiny baby in a manger is God in human form coming to show us the Way. God's choice of incarnation allows us to reflect on the mystery that Christ is the full revelation of God instead of being one who talks about God or one who speaks for or acts as God. But, no, Christ is God. In Heaven and Earth, beloved pastor and scholar Will Willimon explores the idea of Jesus as both fully human and fully divine this Christmas. (The Parlor)

The Middle – The class is using Experiencing Christmas: Christ in the Sights and Sounds of Advent for their 4-week Advent study. The difference between this Sunday School class study and the Wednesday night study will be the number of sessions each group meets, four verses two. (GH 226)



Year End Giving Reminders:

The ministries of Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church are dependent upon your financial generosity. Thank you for your participation in the God's mission through your tithes and offerings. As we wind down 2023 and you plan your year-end giving, here are a few items of note:

- There are several ways to give, including cash, check, via a 1. charitable trust, directly from your 401(K) account, online via ACH or credit card, or via stock transfer. If you're giving online, please note it is less expensive for the church if you use ACH (bank account and routing number).
- 2. If you wish for your gift to be included on your 2023 giving statement, please be sure to begin the process as early in December as possible, especially for gifts of stock and 401(K) distributions. It takes several days for your broker to complete a stock transfer to our Morgan Stanley account, and generally a few weeks to process a 401(K) or charitable trust distribution.
- 3. If you plan to mail a gift, it must be physically at MPPC or postmarked by December 31, 2023. You are encouraged to mail earlier rather than later due to possible USPS delays. If your gift is post-marked or dropped off after December 31, your gift will not appear on your 2023 giving statement.

Your donation to MPPC may gualify for an income tax deduction in accordance with Federal and/or State income tax laws. Please consult with your tax advisor to determine whether your
