On Friday, January 26, 2024, The Village Concert Series will present The In-Between Trio at 7 p.m. at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church.

Charleston, SC based trio, The In-Between features classical soprano Jill Terhaar Lewis with jazz musicians Robert Lewis (saxophone) and Gerald Gregory (piano). The ensemble performs new compositions and arrangements by members of the ensemble.

In the spirit of recent collaborations between classical singers such as Renée Fleming and Anne Sofie von Otter with jazz musician/composers like Fred Hersch, André Previn, and Brad Mehldau, this group explores repertoire that lies both in and in between classical and jazz genres. Through open communication between the two art worlds of classical and jazz music, the program highlights the shared qualities and explores the differences while allowing the listener to enjoy these styles together in the same concert and even within the same piece.

The In-Between ensemble is a regular guest at the Piccolo Spoleto Festival. They perform frequently in the region and have toured in South Carolina, the Pacific Northwest, and last summer in Denmark. They have collaborated with local musicians and recently with Charleston's Poet Laureate Marcus Amaker on a program of Amaker's poetry in spoken form as well as original musical settings by Robert Lewis and Gerald Gregory.

Lenten Study - Meeting Jesus at the Table

Lent comes early this year with Ash Wednesday being February 14, 2024, and the Adult Faith Formation Ministry Team has selected our Lenten study: Meeting Jesus at the Table, by Cynthia M. Campbell and Christine Coy Fohr. A unique feature of this year's study is that we invite you to do the final readings at home during Holy Week; an opportunity to carry the message to the resurrection!

The PCUSA web site offers this about Meeting Jesus at the Table: The Gospels are full of stories of Jesus sharing meals with disciples, friends, even tax collectors and Pharisees. Whether multiplying bread to feed a whole crowd, relaxing with his inner circle, or telling curious elites stories about even greater banquets, Jesus imparts wisdom as he shares the wine and grants forgiveness as he distributes the fish. This eight-chapter resource provides biblical insights along with thoughtprovoking queries regarding our own time, such as whom should we invite to Sunday dinner and who is left out and left behind in our culture today.

Illustrations by artist Kevin Burns complement each chapter and invite further meditation on the Gospel story and its meaning for our lives.

Lenten Study FAQs

About Small Groups: Registration for Small Groups begins January 24, 2024. Participants can sign up for specific or "open" small groups via Realm or by contacting Trish Snead in the church office. You can access and sign up for a group facilitator through your Realm account by going to community/ groups/2024 Lent Small Groups. An "open" group means that you are interested in that small group format (in-person or virtual) and are open to who facilitates your group. "Open" group registrants will be paired with a group. If you would like to facilitate a small group, please contact Dan Wiard or Trish Snead at the church.

Why Small Groups? Small groups are intimate ways to meet and fellowship with other people in the congregation. Conversations are easier; relationships can be deeper. Many small groups continue to meet throughout the year of each Lent.

How do you sign up for a small group? You will be able to sign up for a Lenten Small Group beginning January 24 or by contacting a Lenten Small Group Leader as they become listed in Realm. You can also stop by one of the Lenten Small Group tables on Sunday morning, February 4, or call the church office throughout the week to sign up for a small group. If you do not see a group that meets when you would like, we encourage you to consider facilitating a group that meets at a convenient time for you.

Is there a Kickoff to the Lenten Study? Yes, on Tuesday, February 13, Shrove Tuesday, there will be a kickoff in the Fellowship Hall. Details coming!

When and where do groups meet? All groups are asked to attend the Kickoff gathering Tuesday, February 13, in the Fellowship Hall. Outside of this kickoff gathering, groups can meet any place, any time. We ask that you coordinate times through the church office so others might join your group.

How often do small groups meet? Most small groups will meet weekly during Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14. Groups typically meet six times in addition to the Kickoff on Tuesday, February 13. Some groups will include dinner or light refreshments, others might focus entirely on the lesson. Most groups last between 1-1.5 hours.

Is there childcare? Childcare is available and provided by the church for small groups that meet at the church by request.

Is there a cost to participate in the Lenten small group studies? We ask for a donation of \$10 to cover the cost of your book, Meeting Jesus at the Table. There is no cost for the Kickoff on February 13.

I travel. Can participate in the study while I am away from home? Yes. We hope to offer one or more virtual small groups.

Can I come to the Kickoff if I do not participate in a small group? Absolutely. We hope you will sign up to participate in a small group, but you are welcome and invited to the Kickoff. If you decide you would like to participate in a small group at - or after - the Lenten study Kickoff, we will get you in a group.

The Middle - Share the Dream: Shining a Light in a Divided World Through Six Principles of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr:

Dr. King and the men and women around him were able to change history through the power of a dream that was not rooted in mere human principles. That dream was rooted in the love of God for all his children made in his image. Share the Dream™ is a video Bible study based on the life and teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Each session revolves around one of the biblical principles that shaped Dr. King's life and motivated him to speak on behalf of African Americans in the Civil Rights Movement.

Youngish Adults – Altar Ego: Becoming Who God Says You Are:

Many of us live for approval of others. The problem is that living for what people think of you is the quickest way to forget what God thinks of you. In this study, pastor and author of Winning the War in Your Mind Craig Groeschel shows individuals and small groups how to abandon self-worth based on accomplishments and possessions, turning instead to God to find out who we are. Participants will learn to expose false labels and selfish motives, sacrificing them on the altar of God's truth. As you discover your true identity in Christ, your altar ego will drive your actions, empowering you to live according to God's higher values with a deep confidence in His calling. Rather than living a timid, halfhearted, shallow cultural Christianity, you'll boldly live in the confidence of the God who believes in you. Are you willing to lay it all on the altar?

Connect 3 - When Christians Get it Wrong:

More and more young adults have opted out of Christianity and the church. The reason? Christians. When young adults talk about the problems they have with Christianity and the church, they often name certain attitudes and behaviors they believe are practiced too often by Christians: judging others, condemning people of other faiths, rejecting science, injecting politics into faith, and being anti-homosexual. With his familiar style, Adam Hamilton tackles these issues and addresses the how's and why's of Christians getting it right when it comes to being Christ in the world. Those who read When Christians Get It Wrong will gain a different way of understanding the issues that keep people away from Christianity and keep Christians from living a more compelling faith. Because, honestly, if we don't start getting it right, we may lose an entire generation.

The Academy of Saint John - Wondrium: Searching for the Historical Jesus:

Jesus takes you back two millennia to explore the history, context, and character of a humble carpenter who changed the world. Taught by Dr. Jean-Pierre Isbouts, a professor emeritus at Fielding Graduate University, these thought-provoking episodes, filmed in the Holy Land, bring Jesus and his world to life with vivid detail, offering an excellent companion piece for anyone wrestling with history or with walking in faith.

God's Goods Thrift Store

Ralph and Rev. Terri Wetherell, former members here at MPPC became familiar with God's Goods Thrift Store in Bluffton where Ralph's parents volunteered. They decided they were being Called to start a God's Goods here in Mt. Pleasant. In September 2022, God's Goods Thrift Store opened in Mt. Pleasant. It is located between Pattaya Thai Restaurant and the Aldi Grocery store.

All items sold are donated. God's Goods accepts used jewelry, furniture, housewares, toys, framed items, light fixtures and gently used clothing. The store is operated by 60 volunteers from several churches, MPPC, Palmetto Presbyterian Church where Ralph is a Commissioned Lay Pastor, James Island Presbyterian Church where Terri is an Interim Associate Pastor, Christ Church, and St Peter's Church, among others. All items in the store are priced affordably at less than their usedmarket value. Clothes sell for \$3 or less. Shoes sell for \$2. Clothes donated not in good shape are sold to a textile recycling company. The store is open Wednesday through Saturday from 10 in the morning to 3 each afternoon. With more volunteers a broader population could be served by keeping the store open till 6 pm once per week.

Since opening one year ago, \$62,000 has been donated and \$45,000 has been set aside in reserve. Sales continue to steadily increase. It is expected that next year, not having to reserve funds, that possibly \$100,000 will be given away. Recipients of God's Goods funds have included: MPPC's Hope House, Hope to Home which furnishes apartments for the homeless, Boys/Girls Club, Hibben Methodist Church Warming Shelter, the Navigation Center which assists and shepherds the homeless toward finding mental health. medical attention, and homes, Grace-Based *Grief Resources* for children which provides care packages for first responders to give to children, and Doors to Freedom providing assistance to people rescued from human trafficking.

All of the volunteers enjoy immensely working at God's Goods. We all are rewarded knowing we are caring for our brothers and sisters while having an enjoyable time. And, we all have made new friends.

SO...we enter 2024, grateful for the challenges... because they make us put our heads together with other team members to figure out WHAT needs to be done. We are grateful for patience...for which we prayed, and God so graciously gave us. And, most of all, we are grateful for being blessed with perseverance! It's so easy to feel defeated, but there are great rewards in perseverance!"
