We normally think of Lent—the forty days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday—as a time of fasting and letting go of certain things we like or treasure. Lent can also

be a time of preparation (just like Advent), and an opportunity to restore balance in our lives.

Lent is also a time of intentional personal reflection to prepare ourselves for a resurrection life after Easter Sunday.

Fasting—abstaining from something like social media, coffee, chocolate, alcohol, certain foods—seems to be popular. The idea is that giving up something that is regularly part of your life, will remind you of the sacrifice of Jesus. Doing this, we can focus more on a way of living without the normal distractions, so that we can focus more on God, and respond with generosity through our giving and works of charity.

Lent, to me, is also a great time to focus intentionally on practicing patience in my life, and maybe attain a little more balance in my life.

Patience is more than sitting back or being passive and doing nothing and letting other people make decisions.

Being patient is difficult for me, because it is so contrary to what I want to do—the unthoughtful impulse to react rather to respond, to fight or to flee, rather than to be present in the moment. Patience means that I must be... and not always do. It means that I must fully see, hear, touch, smell and taste all the events happening in and around me.

Patience means that I can again invite God into my life—into the trouble places, the unholy, self-serving relationships, my failures, and all my doubts, the deeply hidden places where I experience personal hurt.

Practicing patience, I use this time of Lent to allow God to tend to all the dark and shadowy parts of my life, to get reassurance that God has fully adopted me as God's child, just as I am.

Lent is fortunately 40 days long, and we do not have to get it right on Ash Wednesday. Maybe even Maundy Thursday comes too soon to have it right. But at least it is an intentional beginning to share my darkest thoughts, my biggest fears, and my greatest joy with God as I ask God to continue to grant me the grace of patience, even long after Lent is forgotten.

During this Lent, I work on having patience with myself and those around me, because I know and see how patient God is with us!

Village Concert Series: The Ben Rosenblum Nebula Project on Friday, March 1 at 7 pm

Join us in the Fellowship Hall on Friday, March 1 at 7 p.m. where Ben Rosenblum brings his awardwinning, genre-bending compositional style to the Nebula Project, a six-piece ensemble featuring a diverse cast of New York City's most in-demand jazz musicians.

Rosenblum boasts an extensive resume, having led bands at prestigious venues around the world (Ravinia, Library of Congress, Kuumbwa Jazz Center; multiple tours in the US, Canada, Europe and Japan) and touring with several Grammy and Juno recognized artists across various musical genres, including Rickie Lee Jones, Kiran Ahluwalia, Curtis Lundy, Nêgah Santos and Laura Anglade. With the Nebula Project, the pianist/accordionist digs deeply into his cosmopolitan roots in NYC to create a truly global music, drawing from influences as diverse as Brazilian forró, Irish reels and jigs, Bulgarian folkloric songs, Dominican merengue and Middle Eastern traditional rhythms, and combining them with an extensive rooting in American jazz and traditional music. Rosenblum leans on personal experiences working with master musicians from these and other areas of the world in order to write explorative, emotional, narrative-driven compositions that have garnered awards from ASCAP, Downbeat and beyond.

Ben Rosenblum Nebula Project is celebrating their February 2023 release, A Thousand Pebbles. Since the Nebula Project's first album release in 2020, Kites and Strings, The Nebula Project was voted runner-up for Best New Artist in JazzTimes' 2020 Readers' Poll, and the album received positive reviews from over twenty publications, including All About Jazz, NYC Jazz Record, JazzTimes, JazzLife (Japan) and more.

During Lent

As you read this month's Pelican, we are two to three weeks into the Lenten study *Meeting Jesus at the Table*. We have read and discussed the stories of Jesus feeding the multitudes (Mark 6:30-44) and immediately following Matthew's decision to follow Jesus as a disciple, Jesus eating with tax collectors (Matthew 9:9-13). They are both feasts. Feeding the multitude is miraculous in that Jesus fed 5,000 men, not including women and children. Jesus knew the people needed food – both body and soul. And he fed them. And with the tax collectors (and sinners), Jesus knew sometimes some of the deepest conversations happen around a shared meal, so he ate with them. But this meal is symbolic, too. Jesus ends the ostracism that Matthew and his friends experienced (as tax collectors and sinners); they are restored to community by including them in his fellowship. And Jesus shows them mercy, God's mercy.

I wonder who we welcome at our table. As Campbell and Fohr ask, "Who belongs and who doesn't? Who is welcomed and who is held at arm's length? How wide are the boundaries of our community? Our nation?" They continue, "Hospitality transforms all who are involved. Host and guest are impacted and changed by relationships that are formed in the breaking and sharing of bread... all of us who have experienced the power of breaking bread with those from whom we have been separated or estranged know that we come away not only changed, but free."

I hope we hear the invitation of our authors, and of Jesus, to look at who is welcome at our table. There are people around us who need food for both body and soul. Will we feed them? The Rev. Dr. Anita Herbert, speaker at our Lenten Kickoff, leaves us with two questions to consider as we walk through Lent. "If we consider Jesus' description of himself as the Bread of Life, what are you hungry for him to provide you during this season of Lent? How would you evaluate who needs a seat at your table? (define table any way you like)"

This Lent, may we be fed and may we feed someone.

Adult Sunday School in March

***Listen: Praying in a Noisy World*, by Rueben P. Job**

We live in a world of noise. Everywhere we go, we hear sounds that compete for our minds and hearts. Listening to God requires a deliberate choice to shut out the chaos around us and focus our thoughts. *Listen*, by Rueben P. Job, is a 40-day experience created to offer help to those new to prayer, those with a daily prayer routine, and those whose lives seem too busy to pray. With a focus on listening prayer and prayer as a two-way conversation, the experience will assist individuals and groups in building and deepening a personal prayer practice and spiritual discernment. As we learn to listen, we find a new depth and fulfillment in our relationship with God and a new experience of God as guide and companion in our lives. The daily prayer pattern includes an invitation, silence, Bible reading, a story, guided time for reflecting and listening, and practical help for developing six specific prayer practices. **(Academy of St. John, SB 206, 9:15 a.m.)**

***Finding Jesus in the Psalms*, by Barbara Roose**

Barb Roose guides the reader through a meaningful encounter with the Psalms through the season of Lent. Combining an interpretation of the psalms with real life stories, the study moves through the familiar words of Psalm 23 toward the painful cries of Psalm 22 uttered by Jesus on the cross. The study includes reflections on the life of King David and the original context of the writings, along with connections between the psalms and the life and death of Jesus the Messiah. **(Connect 3, Parlor, 9:30 a.m.)**

***Meeting Jesus at the Table*, by Cynthia M. Campbell and Christine Coy Fohr**

The Gospels are full of stories of Jesus sharing meals with disciples, friends, even tax collectors and Pharisees. Whether multiplying bread to feed a whole crowd, relaxing with his inner circle, or telling curious elites stories about even greater banquets, Jesus imparts wisdom as he shares the wine and grants forgiveness as he distributes the fish. This eight-chapter resource provides biblical insights along with thought-provoking queries regarding our own time, such as who should we invite to Sunday dinner and who is left out and left behind in our culture today. Illustrations by artist Kevin Burns complement each chapter and invite further meditation on the Gospel story and its meaning for our lives. **(The Middle, GH 226, 9:45 a.m.; Youngish Adults, SB 209, 9:45 a.m.)**

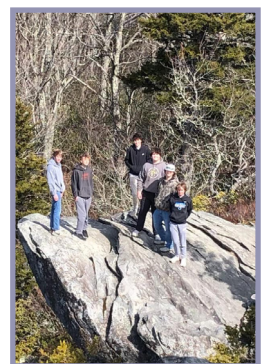
A Note on Confirmation:

Fast forward to March...We welcome our new Director of Children's Ministry Suzy Edwards. Suzy is a PCUSA Certified Christian Educator with a Master of Arts in Theological Studies from Columbia Theological Seminary. Her undergraduate work was in Special Education, and she currently teaches Kindergarten at First (Scots) Presbyterian.

Suzy began her work at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church on Wednesday, February 21, 2024, overlapping briefly with interim Director of Children's Ministry Lynn Wiard. Suzy will be working part-time weekday afternoons (Monday-Thursday)

Featured symbols: palm tree (Palm Sunday), grape arbor (Last Supper), stream (washing of feet), rooster (Peter's denial), rock (prayer in the garden), cross (crucifixion), lily, and a butterfly (Easter).

Mission Trip to the LAMB Institute Tegucigalpa, Honduras July 27 – Aug 3, 2024

The LAMB Institute is a Christ-centered, multifaceted ministry based in Tegucigalpa, Honduras that seeks to reach out to the world with the love of Jesus. LAMB operates an elementary school in one of the most poverty-stricken areas of Tegucigalpa, a residential home for over 60 children suffering abandonment, neglect, abuse – the product of a nation in extreme poverty.

Other ministries include The Transition Program, which provides children of LAMB nearing the age of 18 with a hopeful future; daycare in Flore del Campo; and Joy Christian Academy and Youth in Action, (formerly known as The Alonzo Movement) a large outreach and gang prevention program for inner-city youth.

Our team will be working outside the city at the residential children's home providing construction assistance, coordinating activities for the children, and serving in any other way that LAMB and the Lord call us.

In 2001, George and Molly Greene started Water Mission with a vision that all people have safe water and an opportunity to experience God's love.

Molly also wanted to provide an opportunity for others to understand the day-to-day experience of the 2 billion people affected by the global water crisis. The first Walk for Water was held in Charleston, SC, which remains the location for our flagship event. Since then, churches, community groups, and corporate partners have embraced the vision for the Walk for Water, and the program has spread across the United States. As the Walk for Water continues to grow, our purpose is the same: to provide communities, organizations, and companies with an opportunity to raise awareness about the global water crisis and funds to fight it.

Millions of women and children walk more than three miles to collect water each day for their families. Often, the water collected is unsafe to drink. But there is hope.

This year, we will join together to bring clean, safe water to more than 15,000 people in need around the world.

We walk, so others don't have to.

The event is Saturday, March 23rd 9 a.m and begins and ends at Riverfront Park in North Charleston. You'll walk about 1.5 miles to the Water Missions International HQ where you'll fill a bucket of water, and walk back to Riverfront Park where it will be treated by Water Mission's Living Water Treatment System. This will clean the water and make it safe for all purposes.

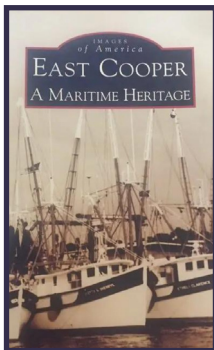

Easter Sunday Flower Cross

All ages are invited to bring flowers to decorate the crosses at MPPC on Easter Sunday. The tradition of the flowering of the cross has been traced back to the 6th century. It is a beautiful way to symbolize the new life that emerges from the death of Jesus on Good Friday.
