The narrator of the Good News of Jesus, Mark, certainly knew how not to mess around with words! He tells the story of Jesus in such a concise way that much of the meaning passes us by if we

are not present and paying attention to the story.

Take Mark 4:35-41 for instance. Jesus announced to his disciples, "Let us go across to the other side." All we know from the beginning of chapter 4 is that Jesus and his disciples were "beside the sea." So, where is "the other side?" Is "the other side" only geographical, or did Jesus have in mind that something will change for them? I suspect Mark had both in mind when he told this story.

I wonder if the disciples voluntarily followed Jesus into the boat, or was there some grumbling going on? Mark didn't tell us, just that later, with the storm raging, they kind of objected, accusing Jesus of not caring about what happened to them.

So, when Jesus told the sea, "Peace! Be still!" can it also be that it was directed at the disciples?

It is interesting that people interpreted the boat on the sea as an image of the church in the storms of this world. In the boat is safety (well, sometimes discontent, but mostly...) Once the disciples were alone in the boat, and Jesus came walking on the water, telling Peter to get out of the boat onto the waters to walk to him and Peter sank when he looked at the waves instead of at Jesus. (Matthew 14:22-33).

Stormy seas are busy surrounding the boat, which is MPPC. Anxiety and fear about the future of all our ministries are developing, as some staff members retire, new staff members are hired; as the Pastor Nominating Committee is narrowing their search for the next "fulltime pastor," or senior pastor; and there's the lingering issues of our budget and money.

How do we respond? Do we leave the boat, to go meet with whom we initially thought is a ghost (Mark 14:26)? Or do we turn onto one another because we feel like we are losing control of whatever? Do we have faith enough to call on Jesus (who, all along, is in the boat with us) because we think we need to wake him up? Thinking of the next few months, do you hear a voice saying, ""Peace! Be still!" "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" Do we find the Lord of the church, whom even the winds and the sea obey?

Peace! Be Still! Have Faith!

MPPC's congregation turned out and did great work during this year's Spring Yard Cleanup. Despite repeated weekend rainfalls requiring rescheduling changes, 45 adults and 34 youngsters showed up to assist disabled and elderly homeowners at 10 yards where our assistance was requested.

The average yard produced 24 full bags of leaves with larger debris usually stacked on top. For the first time every age group at MPPC up through their 70's was represented. All yards were cleaned within two hours with bags neatly lined up at the street.

Support Needed for the Paikans!





As many of you know, our church along with Providence and Westminster have been providing everyday support to Nadia Paikan, Afghan refugee, and her four children, Sodise 6th grade, Taib 3rd grade, Mobara 4k, and Asra 2 years old. We are thrilled that Sodise has joined a soccer team! His coach has been an answer to many prayers and a wonderful addition to Sodise's life as well as the support team's. Sodise and Taib are pictured with the coach's son after a soccer game. We have also learned

that Sodise was approved to receive a mentor from the Be A Mentor organization where our own Towner Magill serves on their Board. Growing up is never easy and especially when you are in a new country and your father, Fraidoon, is still in Afghanistan. We are doing our best to wrap support around the family and specifically Sodise wherever possible.

The boys have received scholarships to both spring and summer camps which is a huge blessing. We are still exploring some summer soccer weeks for Sodise but they will mainly be going to St Andrews Parks and Playground in West Ashley. The family is patiently waiting to hear next steps from US Citizenship and Immigration Services regarding Fraidoon's reunification with his family. Sadly there seems to be no sense of urgency from the government's perspective nor a timeline the family can track. This situation is truly in God's hands and we have done all we can do except wait patiently. How you can help:

- 1. Transportation– We will need volunteers this summer to either take the boys to camp in the morning or bring them home in the afternoon. Camp will run from June 10- August 9. Please reach out to Maryanne Davis maryanne.biddix@ gmail.com/678-620-6029 with any questions or to express interest. We will gladly get you signed up for a ride!
- 2. Financial support- We have a refugee fund at the church that we use to pay for a variety of expenses that are beyond the reach of this struggling family. Checks can be written to MPPC with "refugee fund" in the memo line.
- 3. **Prayers** This family is in constant need of your prayers. A single mother with 4 children between the ages of 12 and 2 would keep any prayer group busy. Throw in family reunification delays and cultural assimilation issues, the need for prayers is never ending.

Continuous Floods

Have you ever had a time in your life when you felt overwhelmed? As soon as you got through one flood, another would come. Have you ever thought...WHY is this happening again?

Well, the ministry team and volunteers at Hope House are sharing these emotions.

Since Hope Cottage opened, it has served many guests with mobility issues. It has been just perfect for that purpose! Built on a slab, there are no steps to climb...and this has kept us from having to turn guests away who were unable to maneuver the steps in Hope House.

Located at the lowest point on the church campus, the Cottage has flooded before, but the two floods in March were the worst. The first brought 5" of flood water inside the Cottage and the second brought 12". Everything inside was ruined. Note the water line in the photos...

We have had two teams of professionals working on a solution to the flooding and there have been varying suggestions. If you are reading this article, please pray for God to guide those making the final decision about the Cottage's future. It has been heart-wrenching to think of losing an asset that has been so valuable to the guests who have rested there.


Pacesetters: Jackie Mickel on Gullah Culture
